

TRACK SQUAD WORKING HARD

Interclass Meet is Scheduled for Next Saturday, Regardless of Weather Conditions.

The track squad spent yesterday afternoon on the fair grounds undergoing annual practice for the first time this year. Everybody is showing up well and anxiously looking forward to Saturday, when the high school interclass meet will be held at 2:30 o'clock at the fair grounds. The Larson is laid up at present with a sprained hip but expects to be back in a suit in a week or so.

Coch Coach announces that the meet will be held, rain, snow, hail or sunshine. Each class will be allowed to enter two men in each event and four places will count. First, 5; second, 3; third, 2; and fourth, 1.

The events have been arranged as follows: 100-yard dash, pole vault, mile, broad jump, 120-yard high hurdles, 440-yard dash, high jump, 220-yard dash, shot put, half mile, decathlon, 220-yard low hurdles, javelin and the relay. Making fourteen events for the various classes to compete for supremacy. All four classes are closely hunched as far as hope can point out and the meet should be fairly fast and closely contested.

COW TESTER COMING HERE

Word has been received that Dr. A. T. Madden, federal tuberculosis tester, will be in La Grande for a week, April 24 and 25, inclusive, for the purpose of testing the cows in this district that were tested by Dr. Truhey last year.

A week's work is being arranged at the county agent's office and plans are being formulated for the testing of not only the ones formerly tested, but new herds as well.

All dairymen who want their cows to be tested should notify the county agent's office as to the number of cows and the location of the farm not later than April 19th. Following this date an outline will be prepared and the farmers will be notified as to what date the tester will handle their stock.

PUPILS WRITE DENTAL ESSAYS

The essay contest, conducted by the State Dental Association among school children in the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades has gone through its first stages. The prize-winners for Union county have been selected and the county superintendent forwarded the prize-winning essays on to the state superintendent where they will be judged for the state prize.

"Teeth and their relation to good health," the essay selected for the fifth and sixth grades, resulted in the selection of Kenneth Owen, sixth grade, Central school, from the first unit, which includes the La Grande schools, and Dorothy Mills, Cove, in the sixth grade, as winner in the second unit which includes all schools outside of La Grande in Union county.

"Health and happiness through good care of the teeth" the essay selected for the seventh and eighth grades found two who stood out as winners. Inez Hughes, eighth grade, River school, received high honors in the first unit, and Ruth Daniels, of Summerville, also of the eighth grade, won in the second unit.

All four who stood high in this county received a prize of \$10.00. The four winners in the state contest will be entitled to \$25.00 each.

APPLICATION IS REJECTED

WASHINGTON, Apr. 14. — The commissioner of the general land office has notified Senator McNary and Representative Sinnott of the final decision rejecting in part the application of the state of Oregon for 32,000 acres of Warner valley lands claimed under the swamp land selections. Rejections are enumerated by sections and the aggregate is not stated, but includes tracts selected under the Carey act, to which the state withdrew its claim, certain other lands patented to adverse claimants and still others rejected 12 years ago.

Because of this belief expressed by Oregon officials that the state's interests may suffer if it is required to disclose its evidence concerning beds of Pelican, Anderson and Mungwump lakes, the state will not be required at this time to make a showing in that respect. Reexamination of the lands in dispute has been ordered made by the chief of the title division at Portland. Testimony will later be taken by Surveyor General Caviness or officials of the Lakewood land office.
