LIQUOR RING IS UNCOVERED

Widespread System Covered Large Part of California With Six Traveling Salesmen on the Road.

SAN FRANCISCO, Apr. 15.—A complete system for distributing liquor throughout California, with six traveling salesmen, three of them women, and a sales list of 490 names, including some of the most prominent citizens of San Francisco, has been uncovered in the arrest here Wednesday of M. N. Connelich, it was announced by Samuel Rutter, prohibition director for California. The names include many well-known attorneys and business men, according to Rutter. In addition to clubs and cafes, the salesmen carried sample cases containing four-ounce vials of the liquor that Connelich had for sale, he said. Connelich, who operated under the name of Central California Vineyard association, had offices in a downtown office building. The customers are liable to charges of conspiracy to violate the prohibition law, according to Rutter, who went into conference with John T. Williams, United States district attorney, to decide on further action. Complete records, showing how much the customers purchased, and a scale of prices for all kinds of wines and liquors, were found. Rutter said, along with directions for delivery and other information. "Leave liquor in house and not at garage," was the note left with one \$400 order written on a printed form, Rutter announced.

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EX-WARDEN ON TRIAL
HELENA, Mont., Apr. 15.—Arguments between attorneys over the admissibility of certain evidence marked the opening of the trial of Frank Conley, former warden of the Montana penitentiary in the state's suit for an accounting. The state alleged that Conley owes it over \$300,000.

THE HOME GARDEN

What is Home without a Garden?

The Clarkia, a typically American plant, set one that had to be taken to Europe to be developed before its possibilities were thoroughly realized. It is one of the prettiest of easily grown annuals, yet it is seen comparatively seldom in the flower garden. It is a sturdy and very easily grown annual and is particularly valuable for garden where the soil is rather light and sandy as it delights in this soil condition.

The Clarkia was named after Capt. William Clark, companion of Lewis, in the famous Lewis and Clark expedition to the northwest. It is a native of the northwestern part of the United States. It is coming into popularity along with other old-fashioned annuals which florists have found grow very readily under greenhouse conditions and furnish the finest sort of material for cutting. They vary from one to three feet high and furnish a series of beautiful soft pinks, salmon, rose, carmine and orange salmon shades with fine white variegates and come both double and single, the double varieties being the more durable for garden display and cutting.

When the plant reaches maturity it sends forth buds from the axils of all its upper leaves, giving long spikes of bloom beautifully interspersed with the leaves. Some varieties give more definite spikes of bloom. Owing to the light and airy grace of these annuals they are particularly fine subjects to be used in window boxes where they may droop their wreaths of bloom over the edges. They will thrive either in full sun or partial shade. There are a number of named varieties offered by seedsmen. If you are not familiar with this fine annual, it would be worth while to try a packet of mixed varieties merely to get acquainted. The varieties can be identified easily from catalogue descriptions when they bloom.

Hard Lumps.

the use of fertilizers, which are put up in bags of convenient size for any lawn large or small. Since fertilizers are generally sold under brand names, it is safe to buy analysis, or formula. The formula is a series of figures, not unlike football signals, which express the composition in per cents as are determined by chemical analysis. For example, a 6-8-2 fertilizer means one containing 6 per cent "ammonia," 8 per cent phosphoric acid, and two per cent "potash," which represent the three fertilizing elements, nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium, respectively. In high-analysis fertilizers these figures should total 14 or more.

The kind and quantity of fertilizer to use depends in a large measure on the soil. A good application for the average lawn in fair condition is from two to five pounds of a 6-8-2 fertilizer for each 100 square feet, applied broadcast. If the soil is very poor, it is somewhat sandy, or has a tendency to pack very hard, it may be better to use a liberal quantity of dry, pulverized manure (which comes in a finely shredded condition), say from four to eight pounds per 100 square feet. This material should be allowed to remain on the lawn, because it is very inconspicuous, it loses its odor very quickly, and it soon finds its way down to the soil surface a little below which are to be found the feeding roots.

Later in the season it is a good plan to top-dress the lawn lightly at intervals of six weeks or so with 5-8-0, 5-7-2 or a 3-10-4 fertilizer, and sometimes with sulphate of ammonia, at the rate of about a pound a square foot. A good time to make these applications is during, or just before, a gentle rain, which will carry the fertilizing material down into the soil to the feeding roots.

The development of a thick and velvety lawn depends much upon keeping the growth cut to a medium and constant length. Judgment will determine just how to adjust the lawn mower as regards closeness of cutting. A good rule to follow, at least during the early summer months, is to cut the grass wherever an inch or an inch and a half of growth is made. When cut in this manner the clippings should be left on the lawn to form a grass mulch over the surface of the ground.

As a warning to those gardeners trying a hotbed or cold frame for the first time—do not let the plants go into the night with the leaves wet. This applies particularly to the more tender plants, such as tomatoes, peppers, egg plants and the cucumbers and melons. Water in the morning.

If moisture collects in drops on the frames, ventilate if the outside temperature will permit. The atmosphere should not be very moist when the outside temperature is low.

Give all the ventilation to plants in frames that the weather will permit. Stickness and vigor are the aims to be achieved.

Sow onion from four to six weeks before they are to be planted in permanent quarters for your own her-mudies. This is about the last call to achieve the greatest possible development of the onion in your garden.

A plot 100 by 150 will furnish vegetables for a family of six, exclusive of potatoes. On smaller plots specialize in some one class of vegetables and raise enough to furnish the family table.

Sprinkle commercial fertilizer and rake or hoe it into the soil when the plants start into growth, not before. A lot of it is wasted if put on too early, particularly the soluble nitrogenous fertilizers.

Don't throw away cucumber seed left over from last year. Cucumber seed germinates at its best when three years old. It is one crop a seedman can hold over with safety and fairness to his customers. Cucumber seed thirteen years old has

been found to still maintain some germinating power.

Better buy your radish seeds by the ounce, as well as other vegetables. An ounce of radish seed will sow 100 feet of row. A few plantings will soon use up that quantity. An ounce of beets will sow 50 feet of row. A quart of peas should sow 100 feet of drill.

Bear in mind that certain weeds for some reason, seem to follow certain crops. Switch the planting from season to season and foil the weeds.

Don't let a rank growth of weeds discourage you. It means that the soil is in fine condition for vegetables—when you move the weeds off.

Try out one or two new varieties of tomato. The tendency at the present time is to discard the big, wrinkled kinds, such as Ponderosa, for table use in favor of the fine, new, round smooth varieties. However, the big fellows which have ribs and wings are excellent for canning, as they give the big yield.

OBREGON TOOL OF ARGENTINE

BUENOS AIRES, Apr. 15.—The chief advisor of President Obregon of Mexico is the Argentine minister here, Dr. Manuel E. Malbran, asserts Dr. Enrique Gil, an Argentine lawyer who has arrived in Buenos Aires after a trip through a number of Latin-American countries. To a reporter of La Nacion Dr. Gil said: "In reality President Obregon adjusts his conduct and his decisions to the counsels of the Argentine minister, Dr. Malbran. His ideas are those of Dr. Malbran when he consults for any decision of importance. Dr. Malbran is in this city in an admirable situation to pursue the diplomacy of Argentina and to enjoy much prestige in Mexico. President Obregon holds him in extraordinary regard."

Dr. Gil said that Mexicans had a poor concept of Argentina and believed that Mexico was the most advanced of the Latin American countries. "So great is the ignorance of Argentina in Mexico," he said "that I was considered a chauvinist and a boaster among a group of Mexicans when I told them that the great majority of the population of our country was pure white and that there were only 20,000 Indians."

Referring to the policy of the United States toward Mexico, Dr. Gil said that any conception that the United States was actuated by motives of imperialism was entirely wrong.

HOBBO FOUND DEAD

ROSEBURG, Ore., Apr. 15.—An unidentified crippled hobbo was found dead this morning in the barn at the Louis Kohlhaugen farm, near Winchester, death evidently having been caused by wood alcohol. The transient was seen in Roseburg last Friday.

One leg was amputated at the knee and a portion of the other foot had been cut away. The body is being held, while an attempt to establish his identity is made.

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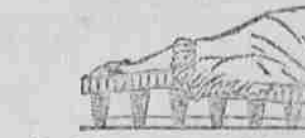


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
