

SUBMERGED SIX TIMES

Island in Pacific Most Lonely Place in World and Dropped Out of Sight Occasionally.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Apr. 15.—A description of what is believed to be one of the most peculiar islands in the world and one of the loneliest spots in the Pacific, Walpole Island, which has been submerged from all indications, was given today by A. C. Mackay, F. R. G. S. representative of the Austral Guano company on the island.

Walpole is about 150 miles east by south of Noumea and contains great deposits of guano. With Surveys Island and the Chesterfield group, it is known by the Austral company. It is a limestone island, 250 feet from the ocean accessible at only one spot, at a break in the cliffs where steps have been cut.

Mackay said that there were remarkably clear indications on the cliffs of successive water levels and that primary coral and other shells on this curious island platform showed that at least six times it must have been at or under sea level. Many traces of ancient human habitation were found in the form of walls, obviously built by men, columns of coral right and left, and a large, high, large tomb and claustral blades instruments, several specimens of which Mackay presented to the Australian museum. Fresh water supplies were discovered in two caves. Mackay expressed the opinion that formerly there was a much greater land surface than at present.

"I found undoubted signs of prehistoric habitation," he said, "I also found in places, where the guano comes on to the coral, the remains of the horned turtle which I am informed have been found nowhere else except in South America and Lord Howe island."

Mackay said that probably the former inhabitants had engaged in boats when the ocean rose and submerged the island or that they had been drowned in the rising tide. The present population of the island consists of six white men, 20 Japanese and about 100 Loyalty Islanders. The staging of these islanders serves to make life less monotonous than it would be otherwise, Mackay said. Poultry and goats are raised for food while vegetables and fruits grow luxuriantly, tomatoes growing as large as 2 1/2 pounds in weight. Cricket and fishing are the main diversions of the residents.

On Sunday the Loyalty Islanders hold two church services, which the whole population attends, he said.

INTERESTED IN FINANCE

PEKING, Apr. 15.—Interest in the financial situation and the handling of government loans has become so acute among the Chinese people that a society has been organized called the People's Financial Supervision Society. No foreign loan is ever contracted by the Ministry of Finance without an immediate clamor on the part of the people, and all financial dealings of government officials and of the government banks are regarded with suspicion by popular organizations. In order to allay this suspicion and keep informed on all matters of finance the new society has been formed with the express purpose of supervising the financial operations of the government and of the two government banks, the Bank of Communications and the Bank of China.

The immediate program of the Supervision Society is one of opposition to the \$50,000,000 loan on the salt surplus which is being negotiated by Minister of Finance Chung Hu. At the first meeting of this self-appointed supervisory board several resolutions were passed condemning the salt surplus loan, demanding investigation and publicity, and warning the Chinese Banking Association. Representatives were appointed to express to the Banking Association and to the Ministry of Finance the attitude of the people toward the loan and government finances in general. Full publicity in every financial operation is the outstanding demand of the People's Financial Supervision Society.

ANNIVERSARY IN OCTOBER

CLEVELAND, O., Apr. 15.—The American Mining Congress, representing mining interests of the country, will observe its 25th anniversary at its annual convention here October 9 to 14. It will also celebrate a growth of mineral production in the United States indicated by a volume of \$6,707,000,000 in 1920, compared with a value of \$445,992,552 in 1897, according to figures of the congress. Canada, Mexico and several South American countries have been invited to participate in an elaborate exposition of mines and mining equipment to be held in the Public hall, which was recently completed here at an approximate cost of \$6,000,000.

Delegations from all the important mining states are expected to attend. Thirty-nine states and territories were represented at the convention in Chicago last October.

Officials of the congress expressed a hope that 1922, like 1897, will bring a revival of the mining industry. In support of that hope they asserted that demand for production of all kinds is increasing and that a number of the large western copper mines have resumed operation.

In detailing the development of the mining industry since the formation of the congress, officials of the organization cited an increase in the output of coal mined in America from 378,776,070 tons in 1897 to 69,558,000 tons in 1920. Copper figures given were 229,571 tons for 1897 and 539,759 for 1920.

"One of the most noticeable changes during the last 25 years," says a statement issued by the congress, "has been the expansion of American interests overseas. The international aspect of the convention and exposition will be in keeping with this change and will indicate the opportunities which are presented not only for the investment of American capital in mining properties in all parts of the world but of steady increase in the utilization of American mine equipment and machinery in foreign markets."

OLD LAW TO BE AMENDED

LONDON, Apr. 15.—The old English law known as the doctrine of coercion which declares that a wife cannot be guilty of a crime when it is committed in the presence of her husband seems likely to be amended now that it has been brought to light in the case of Mrs. Owen Peel who was acquitted of cooperating with her husband, Captain Peel, in defrauding bookmakers by placing bets by means of forged telegrams.

The case has aroused widespread interest and many papers devote editorials to it.

The Times says: "This legal protection of the married woman, a remnant not of chivalry but of mercy, has more than served its time now that it has become a justice of the peace, serve on juries and are elected members of parliament."

The Daily Express learns that parliamentary opinion is definitely in favor of an amendment of the law placing men and women on terms of equality in regard to criminal responsibility and that proper legislation will be introduced at the first opportunity.

"Perfectly ridiculous and out of date" was Lady Astor's comment on the case. "If women demand sex equality in the political and professional world, they should also be prepared to accept the same treatment as men at law."

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BRONZE TABLET TO BE PLACED

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15.—Placing of a bronze tablet in the Federal building at St. Augustine, Fla., relating the historical importance of the site on which the building stands, has been approved by the Treasury Department acting on the request of the St. Augustine Historical Society of which Chauncey M. D. Pew is president.

The tablet will state that the original building was purchased by the King of Spain in 1593 for 1,000 ducats as a dwelling for the Spanish governor general. The site was under the Spanish flag for 200 years and under the British flag for 20 years. It has been under the American flag since July 10, 1827.
