

### GUINEA FOWL IN GREATER DEMAND

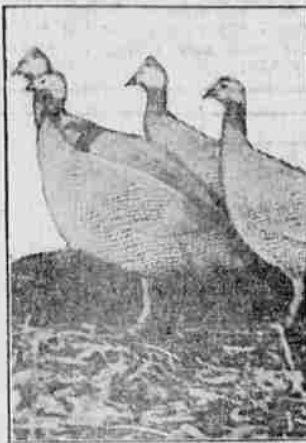
Of Big Value in Various Sections as Substitute for Many Game Birds.

### MAKES GOOD AS POLICEMAN

Motels and Restaurants in Large Cities Eager to Secure Young Birds Which Are Tender and of Fine Flavor.

The great majority of guinea fowl are raised in small flocks of from 10 to 25 upon farms in the Middle West and in the South, but a few of the large poultry raisers, particularly those who are within easy reach of the large Eastern markets, make a practice of raising a hundred or so guineas each year. Many farmers keep a pair or a trio of guineas more as a novelty than for profit, and from these a small flock is raised.

Warns of Marauders. The guinea fowl doubtless would be more popular on farms were it not for its harsh and, at times, seemingly never-ending cry, say poultry specialists of the United States Department of

Agriculture. However, some people look on this cry as an argument in the guinea's favor, as it gives warning of marauders in the poultry yard. Similarly, their pugnacious disposition while sometimes causing disturbances among the other poultry also makes them show fight against hawks and other common enemies, so that guineas sometimes are kept as guards over the poultry yard. Often a few guineas are raised with a flock of turkeys and allowed to roost in the same tree, where they can give warning if any theft is attempted during the night.

Used as Substitute. The value of the guinea fowl as a substitute for game birds such as grouse, partridge, quail and pheasant is becoming more and more recognized by those who are fond of this class of meat and the demand for these fowls is increasing steadily. Many hotels and restaurants in the large cities are eager to secure prime young guineas, and often they are served at banquets and club dinners as a special delicacy. When well cooked, guineas are attractive in appearance, although darker than common fowls, and the flesh of young birds is tender and especially fine flavor, resembling that of wild game. Like all other fowl, old guineas are very likely to be tough and rather dry.

RIDDING HENHOUSE OF MITES Cleanliness and Disinfection Required to Destroy Parasites That Live on Fowls.

To rid the henhouse of the little red mite that stunts the hens so much requires cleanliness and disinfecting. The fith must be cleaned up, the house ventilated and the sunlight let in. Removable roasts and drop boards will help clean up the house. To disinfect the roasts and house everything should be painted or sprayed with a solution of two parts of oil and one part of stock dip. Applications should be made in pairs about five or six days apart in order to kill the mites that have hatched since the last spraying.

GREAT ASSISTANCE OF BIRDS Little Feathered Songsters Do Much Toward Good Crop of Fruit by Devouring Insects.

A good crop of birds goes a long way toward a good crop of fruit. Encourage the children to feed the birds during the cold, stormy weather and in spring they will pay you a hundred-fold by clearing the orchards of insect pests.

### REFUGEES STILL LEAVING HOMES

BERLIN, Apr. 21.—Hordes of Russian refugees are flocking here on every train. The arrivals have settled themselves in a section of the city which they occupy almost to the exclusion of other nationalities, and have opened their own restaurants, clubs, saloons and theatres. Some of the Russians are wealthy, but most of them are penniless.

The police have found them a problem as they insist upon their own customs, and have little commerce with the German. The greatest difficulty is found in compelling the immigrants to observe the one o'clock closing regulations. They follow the Russian custom of beginning dinner after midnight and continuing their eating and drinking until daylight.

In several of these restaurants former wealthy Russians are working as waiters, cooks, or entertainers. A prince and his wife, a baron, and another of their countrymen constitute the orchestra in one small eating place. They were bankrupted by the revolution and must work or starve.

Profiteers who made fortunes out of the Russian revolution frequent the cafes in this quarter, where they have become conspicuous figures in the night life because of their lavish expenditures.

The German newspapers complain that the great influx of easterners has deprived Berlin of its "German character." One paper asserts Germany's capital city has become "a foreign colony, as surely as it would have become if our enemies had marched in and taken it." Another declares Germans have become "guests in their own homes."

Government quarters, which have shown little concern for the financial status of the refugees, have suddenly become intensely interested in the new arrivals, particularly from Poland and Russia, fearing an epidemic of typhus and cholera. German Red Cross physicians have warned the government that unless closer border control can be maintained an epidemic in the spring is certain. The German Red Cross has also notified the government that there is danger of the Russians carrying the plague to America unless greatest precautions are taken, for scores are seeking admission to the United States.

### Poor Boys Who Became Great

ELIAS HOWE, THE FARMER'S BOY, INVENTOR OF THE SEWING MACHINE.

In Spencer, Massachusetts, in 1825, a delicate, lame, six-year old boy, son of Elias Howe, the miller, worked with other boys making brushes.

Having been brought up in his father's mill, young Elias Howe loved machinery. When he left home he worked in a cotton mill, and later in a machine shop. He earned so little money that his wife was obliged to sew long into the night. To help her, and others like her, he invented the sewing machine.

It was in 1845 that he produced a machine that did excellent work. The tailors of Boston refused to use it, for, they said, it would throw men out of work. In despair the inventor became engineer on a

locomotive. Still having faith in his invention he induced his brother to go to England and try to sell it. Finally, Elias went to England. For months he struggled with poverty and harsh treatment, and then returned to New York with only a few cents. His wife died, largely because of the privations she had had to endure. The few possessions Elias Howe owned were lost at sea. And, to make matters worse, a number of other inventors infringed his patents.

When Howe was at last able to defend his rights and make sewing machines, the New York tailors started riots, fearing that they would be thrown out of work, blind to the fact that all so-called labor saving machinery increases the pro-

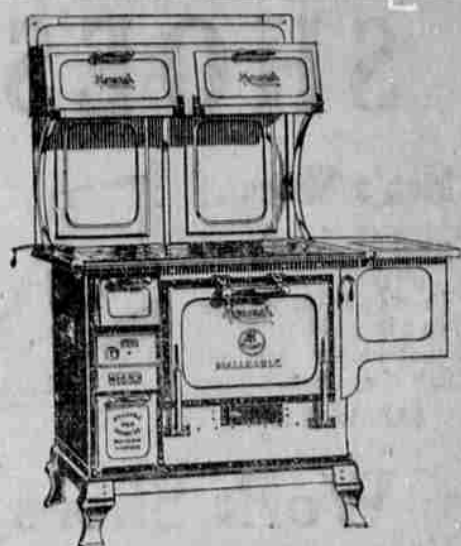
duelles of labor. Howe persisted with the persistence that marks greatness, and won all his battles. Huge royalties poured in upon him, at one time amounting to \$4,000 a day. His reward came too late. Hardships had weakened him, and he died at forty-eight. But he had conferred upon the world a priceless benefit.

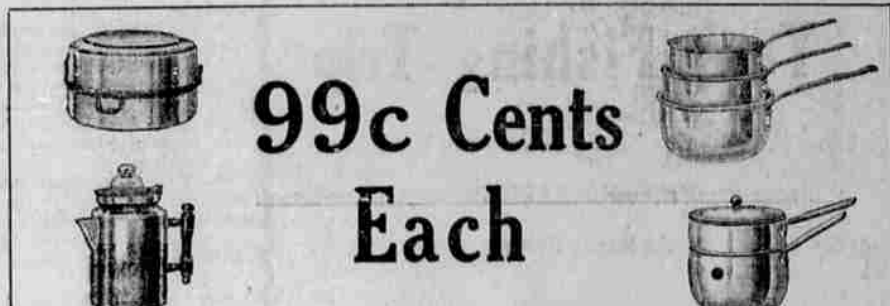
