SALES LARGER THAN EXPECTED

J. C. Penney Stores Report Prospects of Selling \$55,000,000 Merchandise This Year.

PORTLAND, Apr. 24.—The J. C. Penney company's chain of more than 300 stores handled sales aggregating \$46,200,000 during the year, according to announcement of George H. Bushnell of New York, vice-president of the company, who is presiding at the district convention of store managers of the northwest district which opened at the Multnomah hotel Friday. Mr. Bushnell declared that business was picking up rapidly and predicted that the company's sales for the coming year would total \$55,000,000.

About 90 men are attending the convention, representing company stores in Oregon, Washington, Montana, Northern California and Northern Idaho.

Conventions already have been held in St. Louis and Salt Lake City and one will be held in St. Paul after the Portland gathering.

Speakers at yesterday's gathering included Mr. Bushnell, G. G. Hanz, third vice-president and sales manager, and E. L. Whitman, connected with the advertising department.

Among the speakers at today's session will be Dr. Thomas Tupper, lecturer from New York City, who is connected with the educational department of the company.

The convention proper will close tonight, but the store managers will stay in the city until next week to meet the company's buyers.

The silverware was a wedding present and was valued highly by the owner.

Martinez is being arraigned before the justice court this afternoon at 2:00 o'clock.

BURGLAR MAKES HIS GETAWAY

Carpenter tools, amounting to about \$200.00, were stolen from the shop of C. DeKeyser late last night. Mr. DeKeyser's shop was in the Wade Brothers building which was practically destroyed by fire Saturday evening, and as part of his shop was still standing he left his tools unprotected.

Apparently the robber simply swept the tools into a sack or some other receptacle and left in a hurry. The police are investigating the case but nothing definite has as yet been discovered.

BASEBALL CLUB IS CONFIDENT

Confidence of victory for the local club when they play Cove at La Grande in the opening game of the season next Sunday as a result of the showing made by the club yesterday in a practice game with the high school team.

The game was seven innings and the local nine is far stronger than last year. If yesterday's showing can be considered a criterion of their ability, first class fielding that exhibited lots of pep and hustling came to light and La Grande is stronger with the bat than at any time during the last few years. Hardly an error occurred in the fielding, and the boys were hammering the ball all over the lot with husky drives that meant extra bases.

MARY GARDEN WILL RETIRE

Directorship of the Chicago Grand Opera Company to be Given Up by Feminine Star.

CHICAGO, Apr. 24.—Mary Garden announced Sunday night her retirement as director general of the Chicago Opera company, a position which she has held for the past year.

"I am an artist and I have decided that my place is with the artists, not over them," she declared in a statement which was taken as an indication that she would remain with the organization as a singer.

"When Mr. Harold McCormick bestowed the honor on me, naming me director general of the Chicago Opera company," the statement continued, "it was understood that I would hold the position for a year, which meant the end of the reign of grand opera in Chicago under Mr. and Mrs. McCormick."

"The new civic organization through its president, Mr. Samuel Insull, elected me again general director—which honor I now decline—my fighting spirit tells me to stay, but my reason bids me go."

CARPENTER SHOP IS BURNED DOWN

The building owned by Wade Brothers at 1509 Adams caught fire Saturday evening at about 8:00 o'clock and, owing to slow action in turning in the alarm, was practically destroyed by the time the fire department arrived. The fire was checked but the building was nearly a total loss.

The fire apparently started in the living apartments of C. DeKeyser, who lived there and conducted a carpenter shop in the building. His loss was considerable, as was J. A. Bugg's, who had a paint shop in the building. The house was covered with \$500.00 insurance and the carpenter shop and paint shop with \$500.00 and \$700, respectively.

The cause of the fire is not known.
