SEASON STARTS NEXT SUNDAY

Intermountain Baseball League Will Open Season with Game Here.

The only thing that remains to be done is to bribe the weather man to have a large and generous supply of sunshine on hand Sunday, the opening date of the Intermountain Baseball League, composed of La Grande, Union, Cove, Elgin, Baker and Haines.

La Grande and Cove will—if the weather man obliges—start hostilities on the local fair grounds at that time. At the same time Union will invade the Elgin camp and the Baker ball tossers will receive the Haines bunch on Baker's grounds.

The fans who expect to see a bang-up ball game between the locals and the Covies will not be disappointed. If the old dope bucket isn't leaking, Cove, according to latest reports, has the same old bunch of husky clouters and the necessary pitchers to make things interesting for La Grande. On the other hand the home team is going onto the field with a squad of athletes that will put many a team to shame. The outcome of the game rests with fate but be it said that if the game isn't interesting, that Mt. Vesuvius is merely a side show in a small town circus.

Nothing on earth is the matter with La Grande's pitching staff. McInnis, temporary captain, McGee and Carroll are a trio of heavies that are going to be hard to beat. McInnis and Carroll are old La Grande slab artists and McGee comes to La Grande from the Blue Mountain League where he performed in creditable manner for Helix last year. With Johnson and Hannifan behind the bat nothing is going to be lacking in the battery. Which battery will start the game is yet unknown.
