IMPROVEMENT CONTRACT LET

Macadamizing on N and Second Ordered; New Improvement District Now Created.

By a vote of two to one the city commission passed an ordinance providing for the construction of driveways over curbs at the meeting held last evening. In order to construct the driveways the persons or firms constructing them must secure a permit from the city recorder.

In connection with the construction provisions, the ordinance reads as follows: "That the concrete curb is to be broken out to the bottom of the gutter and a concrete incline constructed and brought to grade not to exceed two and one-half feet back of the curb line unless otherwise approved by the city engineer.

An ordinance was unanimously passed authorizing the signing of a contract with Ruscoe Neal for improvements in District 119. This refers to the proper construction of gravel pavement on N avenue and Second street.

The bids received on the repair of the fair ground fences were rejected after discussion upon the matter of the city doing the work with hired labor. The matter was laid upon the table until the next meeting.

The proposition to exclude Block 108 from the city fire limits was discussed and continued until the next meeting. A petition asking for the construction of a concrete conduit beneath the sidewalk from west Fir street to between block three and block four on Jefferson avenue was received. The commission ordered a district of improvement created to attend to this matter.

Several other routine matters were discussed before the adjournment of the meeting.

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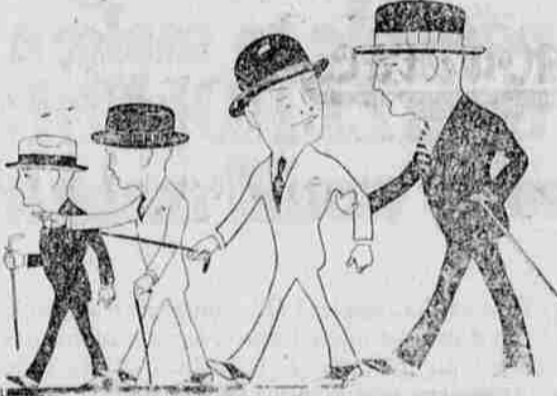
