

RESERVE SYSTEM HIGHLY PRAISED

(By Associated Press)
TOLEDO, O., Apr. 28.—That the Federal Reserve system of the United States had done a great service to the world and was a deciding factor in winning the war for the allies was the statement made here to bankers representing the Toledo Clearing House Association by John Jacob Arnold, of the Bank of Italy.

Mr. Arnold, who represents his institution in its foreign service in this country, said in part:

"Previous to the great war European bankers looked upon the banking system of the United States as a rather incomplete affair, but since the establishment of the Federal Reserve system the completeness of your banking system is recognized by all the great bankers of the world. Especially are the London bankers appreciative of its make-up and results it has achieved since its beginning."

Arnold said he believed the country was well on the way to permanent recovery from the effects of the war. He said the great need was production in the farm products of Europe. The vanquished should be sold raw materials and their manufactured articles bought in order for them to pay their debts, he declared, continuing that here can be no permanent business prosperity until foreign trade relations are on a firm basis.

UKRAINE NOW IS VERY QUIET

KIEV, Apr. 29.—The 14th Ukraine, the most of which are under the control of the Red Army, is at present very quiet. The Ukrainian people are now in a state of temporary peace. The Red Army is much as by hunger. All the Ukrainian war-mongers are food and quiet.

The Ukraine has had 15 governments since October, 1917. It has

been a battleground for Communists, Nationalists and Czarists and, Polish followers of return, the Ukrainian Nationalists, and all manner of men and parties.

The tragedy and ruin of Russia's revolutions is best seen in the Ukraine. Its great farms have been laid low. Its rich lands are lying fallow and going to waste.

Its fine railway systems have been shot to pieces. Its bridges have been blown up. It has been damaged more than any other part of Russia.

In this former land of plenty dozens and dozens of dead bodies are dropped off at each railway station, dead from hunger or typhus.

ASK FORD TO DEVELOP POWER

PORTLAND, Apr. 28.—Henry Ford is invited to come to Oregon and undertake hydro-electric projects, in a resolution adopted by the Oregon Hydro-Electric League and reported Monday.

"We endorse the principle of Ford's attitude toward labor and in general terms his proposal to take over Massey's plant and be it further resolved, that we urge the congress of the United States to give the Ford plan liberal consideration and that we invite the Ford company to extend their manufacturing business to the Columbia basin, where the abundance of practical water power, timber and other raw materials is unequalled."

EXTINCTION OF ELKS THREATENS

PORTLAND, Apr. 28.—If elk herds of Western Oregon are to be preserved, every sportsman and Elk club member of the state must co-operate with the state game commission to bring the killers of these wild animals to justice, declares F. M. Brown, chief deputy game warden, who returned today from a trip through the Hecla country in Lane county.

Brown found reports of wholesale slaughter of young elk confined in that district and arrested Herman Larson and Berry Bray of Hecla on charges of killing and having in possession elk meat. He also arrested Frank Stevens of Ten Mile Creek on a charge of killing deer on a state game reservation. The Larson case will be tried at Eugene Wednesday.

During the investigation trip through the mountains Brown reported that he and M. G. Christensen and E. S. Hawker, deputies, hiked 70 miles through the worst snow, hail and rain storms of the season in that section.

THIRTY-TWO DEAD

PREST, France, Apr. 28.—Thirty-two lives were lost when the French steamer *Deputy Athys* Tallandier, a vessel of 3000 tons, bound from Rotterdam for Brest with a cargo of coal, foundered Tuesday night off the northern coast of Brittany, during a violent storm. The captain of the ship, the sole survivor, was picked up Wednesday by the Greek steamer *Pelagia*.

At the close of the convention she will resign her position as regional director. It is contrary to the league's policy that its officers hold a political office and Mrs. Simmons will enter the race for the state legislature.

TWENTY DIE IN FIRE
