'WILD BIRDS' A BIT TOO WILD

SAN FRANCISCO, Apr. 28.—"Wild Birds," the year's prize play of the Greek Theatre players of the University of California, is too wild for San Francisco audiences.

Peter Peschon, censor for the San Francisco police department, ordered the play withdrawn from the players' club theatre here Tuesday night as "immoral." The play had been given here five nights. Previously it had been shown to campus audiences in Wheeler hall on the University campus at Berkeley.

About half the players are university students, half professionals. Peschon is not the only one to have taken exception to the play. For days a tempest has raged in university circles over certain situations in the play.

President David P. Barrows of the university was himself drawn into the melee. He has promised to scrutinize future campus plays more closely. He is quoted to the effect "the play is not necessarily immoral" but in light of the "heavy" stuff that has been produced, "it will be better to let the play go in favor of something lighter."

Corporal Peschon said concerning the official police view: "The thing dealt too closely with family affairs."

The play is the handiwork of Dan Tetheroh. It was selected after a statewide contest among students of the university. The judges who selected Tetheroh's work were Eugene O'Neill and Susan Glaspell, playwrights, and George Jean Nathan, Magazine editor and dramatic critic.
