## Annual Exhibit at High School Friday Was Comprehensive

The manual training classes and the home economics department gave an exhibition of their work during the past year in the manual training and home economics rooms yesterday afternoon, beginning at 2:30 o'clock and continuing until 5:30 o'clock.

In the manual training department the exhibition was divided into four sections, woodwork, lathe work, forge work and mechanical drawing. The mechanical drawing was very good and the wood work was also of a high class. In the lathe work section both wood, steel and iron work was exhibited. Nearly every kind of a simple tool such as a hammer, chisel, etc., had been constructed by the boys in the forge department. Mr. McEachran, manual training instructor, and Cecil Snow, assistant, were in charge of this exhibit.

Upstairs in the domestic art room a large number of exquisite dresses, skirts, blouse and lingerie, made of wool, cotton and silk materials were on display. Some of them were made over but all looked as if they had just come from a professional dressmaker. Other problems that the seamstress confronts were exhibited also.

In the domestic science department enticing foods of every variety were on exhibit. Savory salads, dainty pastries and many other dishes were on exhibition. Cookies and doughnuts were present in great numbers. A large amount of canned goods were on display.

WENATCHEE, Wash., Apr. 29.—Knocking the soap box from under an I. W. W. Orator, Deputy Sheriff Lay yesterday, single handed, broke up a meeting of 65 professed "Wobblers" at the Great Northern construction camp. The men were paid off and told to leave the grounds, which they did.

Early today circulars appeared on the streets headed "Strike Cal." The circular is signed "General Construction Workers' Industrial Union No. 310 of the I. W. W." The strike is to take effect Monday, according to the circular. Eight demands are listed, among them an eight-hour day, \$4 for eight hours' work, no Sunday work except in case of an emergency, and that the company furnish bed sheets, to be washed once a week.

PORTLAND, Apr. 29.—Elks from all over Oregon and Washington will take part in the parade which will be a feature of Prosperity Week festivities in this city. The Festival commission has selected Thursday May 18 as the day for the demonstration and Major John R. Hibbard will act as grand marshal. **Dahlia Really Mexican.**  
There seems to be an impression that the first dahlias to be cultivated in Europe and America were single-flowered forms. This is a mistake; the very first species to be described and figured, Dahlia pinnata, was a form with a duplex or double head. It was propagated in the royal gardens at Madrid from roots of Mexican origin, and was named by the botanist Cavanilles in 1791 in honor of Andrea Dahl, a distinguished pupil of Linnæus.

## Thomas Tongue Jr.

STRIKES BACK AT MALICIOUS REPORT AND THOSE CIRCULATING IT.

(From Portland Oregonian, April 26.)

"Wide circulation, both in the press and by 'passing the word along,' has been given a malicious report originated by the opponents of Ralph E. Williams, to the effect that Senator McNary questions the loyalty of Mr. Williams and is opposed to his re-election as republican national committeeman," said Thomas H. Tongue, Jr., republican state chairman.

While in Portland on business yesterday State Chairman Tongue took occasion to give the rumor "one on the chin."

"I know this report to be absolutely false and untrue," continued Mr. Tongue. "The story is unauthorized, unfathered and underhanded. It is election propaganda pure and simple, created for a purpose, and should not mislead the friends of Senator McNary or anyone else."

Part in Contest Denied.

"In a telegram to me, bearing date of April 22, 1922, Senator McNary said:

"Am taking no part in contest for national committeeman nor in any other political contest. Indeed, no one has ever requested an expression from me concerning any of the candidates and I have authorized no one to speak for me."

"I positively know from recent correspondence with the senator that he not only does not question the loyalty of Mr. Williams, but feels exceedingly friendly to him.

"Since his election as republican national committeeman for Oregon, Mr. Williams has done everything in his power to build up the republican party to do away with factional differences to secure harmony and to elect the entire republican ticket at every election.

Mr. Williams Is Praised.

"Recognition by the republican national committee of the high order of ability and untiring service of Mr. Williams to the party resulted in his election to the vice-chairmanship of the republican national committee, an honor never before conferred upon a western man. This reflects credit not only upon himself, but upon the state of Oregon.

"It is one of influence secured only by painstaking labor and years of service. It means much to the state, and it would be a very serious mistake at this time for the republican voters of Oregon to defeat Mr. Williams and elect a new man who would be at the foot of the committee instead of its vice-chairman."
