 ELGIN, Apr. 27.—The funeral of Alfred Hill, the fourteen-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Walley Hill, was held from the Christian church at 1 o'clock Tuesday. The news of the boy's death on Sunday came as a shock to his friends for he had been thought out of the dangerous period of his illness, and making a satisfactory recovery. A relapse caused his death before noon Sunday. The high school of which he was a member, held no session on the afternoon of the funeral. The burial took place at the cemetery in Cricket Flat, which is near the family home.

The Bookworm

"News Hunting on Three Continents," by Julius Chambers is a collection of reminiscences that will appeal for its vivid recital of great news stories, well-known criminal cases, peoples and affairs. The author has been managing editor for two such great papers as the New York Herald and the World.

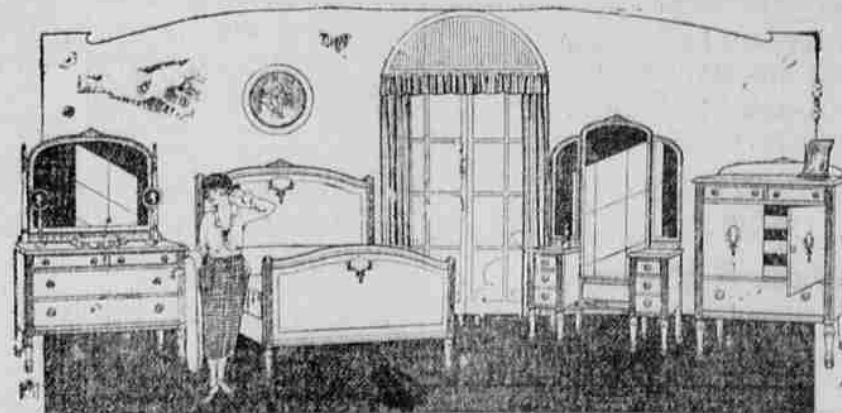
