PETITION FOR RECALL FILED

Two Members of Public Service Commission Affected; Not Expected to Resign.

SALEM, Ore., May 1.—Completed petitions, upon which it is proposed to submit to the voters on May 19 the question of recalling Fred A. Williams and Fred G. Buchtel, members of the Oregon public service commission, were filed officially with the secretary of state here tonight. The petitions were presented by W. E. Richardson, F. S. Myers and Robert G. Duncan, members of the so-called recall committee.

Figures compiled by the secretary of state tonight showed that the petitions directed at Mr. Buchtel contained 33,464 names. This is approximately 800 more signatures than necessary. The petitions filed against Mr. Williams contained 42,561 signatures or more than 1000 names in excess of the number required by law.

Friends of Mr. Williams and Mr. Buchtel intimated tonight that neither of the officials will resign and that they will allow their names to go on the ballot at the recall election. Both Mr. Williams and Mr. Buchtel were out of the city today.

In case the secretary of state calls the election, mandamus proceedings probably will be instituted in the supreme court by Roscoe Hurst, Portland attorney, to test the constitutionality of the recall law and to determine whether the petitions were handled legally by the state department.

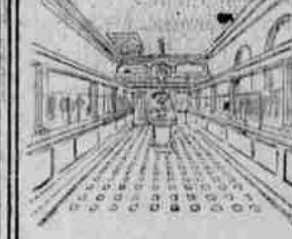
