OPENER IS WON BY LA GRANDE

Cove Takes Small End of Score After Ninth Inning Rally by Local Men.

In a ninth inning rally, such as is featured in fiction, the La Grande ball team came from behind and defeated the strong Cove nine yesterday afternoon at the fair grounds by a score of 10 to 9. Barely has such an interesting game been played here as early in the season. The game was loosely played during the first few innings but in the latter part of the contest both teams tightened up and delivered a clayey brand of ball.

Bud Theison, left fielder on the locals, was the sensation of the day, and his two-bagger in the last of the ninth which scored two men was responsible for the victory. Both he and Rosenbaum hit every time up. Bud got one homer, one three base hit, one two bagger and three singles. Rosenbaum clouted out four singles and one two bagger.

McInnis buried a splendid game, going the entire nine innings, and of the 16 hits made off him, he was responsible for eight. Eight singles were credited to the visitors owing to errors. "Mac" whiffed eight men and passed none and helped things along by clouting out a two bagger in the fourth that scored two men.

The game was featured by an excess of slugging and errors. Thirty-eight hits were piled up by both teams and fourteen errors. La Grande made 22 hits and 8 errors to Cove's 16 hits and 5 errors.

Cove took an early lead in the first inning by scoring two runs on errors and in their half La Grande tallied once and got Jewell, Cove pitcher, in as tight a hole as ever a twirler faced. Theison, first up, hit a three-bagger but was caught at the plate on attempting to score on Rosenbaum's single. Jewell walked Dunn and Crews and Hickey's single scored Rosenbaum and filled the bases with but one out. After Crews had been caught at second and with two men on bases Jewell came out of the hole by fanning Meserve.

In the next frame "Red" Alexander replaced Jewell and pitched the remainder of the game. Although he pitched 12 strike outs, the locals found him for 19 hits in the remainder of the game.

With the score 7 to 2 in the latter part of the fourth the locals staged a rally, started with Theison's homer, and tallied four times, making the count 7 to 6 in Cove's favor. From then on Cove steadily drew away until the beginning of the seventh, when the score stood 9 to 6. During the remainder of the game "Mac" held the visitors to two hits and the home team found "Red" for four more runs.

Hickey, at short, had a bad day and contributed four errors but made up for them partly by scoring Rosenbaum in the first. Woods and Meserve were well at the bat and Woods was replaced in the sixth by McGee after making two errors. From then on La Grande played a No. 1 ball and in the seventh and eighth, Cove went down one, two, and three.

With a win over last year's champs securely tucked under their belts La Grande has a nice chance to top the percentage column when the season ends. A large crowd was present yesterday and it appears that the home team will not lack support this year.

Next Sunday La Grande will play at Union, Elgin at Haines and Baker at Cove.

Lower Courts Are Reversed by the U. S. Supreme Court

Same Principle Upheld in Three Shipping Board Cases Today by Chief Justice W. H. Taft.

WASHINGTON, May 1.—The emergency fleet corporation of the U. S. shipping board is not a governmental agency in the sense that it cannot be sued with its consent, the supreme court decided in the cases brought by the Sloan Shipyards corporation and others of Washington state and the Astoria Marine Iron Works.

The court reversed both cases which had been decided in the lower courts in favor of the government. The court upheld the same principle in deciding the case of trustee in bankruptcy of the Eastern Shire Shipbuilding corporation in which the fleet corporation contended it is entitled to priority in distribution of the bankrupt's estate.
