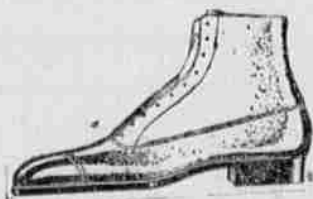

KYOTO, May 2.—Free from the maze of brilliant ceremonies which have marked his visit to Tokio and other large cities of the north, the Prince of Wales will spend five or six days resting here before resuming his journey to the southern extremity of the empire. Word has gone out that aside from the brief welcoming ceremonies, the Prince is to be treated as an ordinary tourist.

From the Grande Ronde river and mixing it with cement to manufacture all kinds of building blocks and cement pipe. The plant is running every day and Mr. Clinton, who is manager, stated that the outlook is excellent for increased business.

Boiler Has History.
A notable feature of the plant is the boiler. It is not much for beauty but it is a substantial old fellow.

A. B. Cherry bought the boiler from a saw mill and started the A. B. C. Laundry with it. The laundry outgrew it and it was set aside. When Mr. Cherry sold out the laundry business and entered the green house construction he bought the boiler and it started the La Grande green houses.

Here also it was outgrown and now Mr. Clinton is starting the concrete plant with the same boiler. "It is a wonder," said Mr. Cherry, "and the success of the concrete factory is assured for the old boiler never yet has scored a failure—unless it was in the saw mill. I can't swear to the success of a saw mill venture but there are men who can."

Flour Mills Grinding Away.

"Of course we grind away. What else do you suppose we are here for," remarked Chet Bidwell of the Pioneer Mills, as the large crowd of Ad Club members hovered into the door. And then Mr. Kiddle and Mr. Bidwell took the party through the entire plant, showing them where the Grande Ronde valley wheat is made into money; where the Chinamen get good cuts from the soil of the Grande Ronde just the same as the millionaire gets his biscuits from the same soil. It was interesting to hear the reference to the old bar mills made by young men, each of whom claimed he remembered well when the bars were used and the old mill stream with its faithfulness to the water wheel was legend.

The entire occasion was a fine event and everyone enjoyed the trip to island which included one of the best dinners ever served in this valley.
