HORSEMEN TO CONVEVE SOON

Enterprise Is Meeting Place of Oregon Stockmen's Association Annual Convention.

ENTERPRISE, May 2.—The convention of Oregon Cattle & Horse Raisers association, to be held in the latter part of May in the next large job which Enterprise has on hand and committers have been quietly making preparations for several months past. Last week a canvass of most of the town was made and the homes which can provide lodgings for visitors were listed. It appears that more rooms are likely to be needed, but a good start has been made in this direction.

The entertainment of the visitors will devolve on the town and its stockmen of the county in large measure. A dance will be given one night. A great banquet will perhaps be the crowning feature of the convention. This must be in the hands of town committees largely, as the stockmen will not be able to give it much personal attention.

With the object of providing the best of service and food, and also of keeping down the expense, it is proposed to ask people of town and in the country to make donations of cooked food very liberally for this banquet. A call will be sent for specific gifts in plenty of time. There will be a large force of waiters and helpers.

A cowboy breakfast will be served one morning, and this will be managed by the stockmen, who know best the requirements. This is an annual event at the state conventions.

One entertainment feature which has been discussed and outlined, will be an auto trip through the stock raising portion of the county, probably as far east as the Cheesminum beef pasture, and winding up at Wallowa Lake for supper.

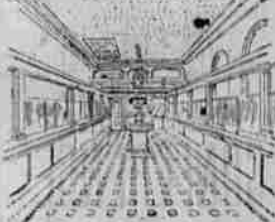
