SEA WATER AND BREAD IS DIET

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 5.—Living for six weeks on mixed sea and fresh water and limited bread rations, 500 children and 3,000 adult Greeks have arrived here on the Greek steamer Michael Archangel from Novorossiysk, Russia, with no food or water aboard.

Suffering from cholera and other epidemic diseases, many of the refugees were ill and two had died at sea. Greek military authorities and delegates of the Greek High Commission inspected the ship, supplied medical aid and arranged for emergency food supplies to last the vessel until she reached Saloniki, where the able-bodied will be debarked for transportation to the tobacco farms and road camps in the vicinity of Kavalla.

These refugees were recruited from among the more than 20,000 Greeks who were driven from their homes by the Bolsheviks and who have been waiting for two years for repatriation. The condition of the others is said to be serious, with from 25 to 30 dying daily of hunger.

Radio Explained

ANTENNA RESISTANCE
(HIGH FREQUENCY RESISTANCE)

When a steady direct current flows in an electrical conductor the current is distributed uniformly throughout the entire cross section. If the current should increase and decrease periodically in strength this would not be the case. The reason for this is that the conductor has the property of self-induction, which tends to prevent any change in the strength of the current flowing through it. With any change in current strength, which takes place in spite of the self-induction, there are electromotive forces induced in the material of the conductor itself. The induced electromotive force always opposes the electromotive force applied to the conductor, and they are greatest at the center of the conductor. If we have such electrical forces acting in opposition to the force that is trying to force current through the conductor, the net force remaining to actually force the current to flow is decreased. The current strength in the center of the conductor is reduced below that which we would find if there were no opposing forces. On the surface of the conductor, however, the effect of the self-induced electromotive force is to aid the flow of current. It naturally follows, then, that the current finds less opposition on the surface of the conductor.

Another source of actual ohmic resistance is in the ground connection and the grounding system itself. A soldered connection reduces resistance and so does moist soil surrounding the ground wires, plates, water pipes or what it is used to make actual connection between the system and the earth. A good counter-poise ground will often be found superior to what may have previously been considered to be a very good grounding system buried in the earth.
