Nelsons in Baker

Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Nelson and children are spending the week-end in Baker, where Mr. Nelson is in conference with W. E. Meacham, president of the Old Oregon Trail association, regarding the proposed automobile trip from Eastern Oregon to Salt Lake within a few days. The trip is intended to mark the Oregon Trail at such points in southern Idaho as are now in doubt. At certain points the present roads detour from original Oregon Trail. A further purpose of the trip to Salt Lake is to persuade the state of Utah to brand the road from Salt Lake north as the Old Oregon Trail and eliminate present names applied to various sections. If the plan materializes the road from Salt Lake to The Dalles will be known as The Old Oregon Trail whereas the same road is at present described by four names, each applied to certain geographical sections.

PRICE IS DELIGHTED

Recently, the Canada Cooperative Wool Growers, a five-year-old organization of some 12,000 wool growers, has requested assistance from the local association, in considering adopting the contract feature used by the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers. The Wyoming and Utah associations have also corresponded with Manager R. A. Ward of the local association, relative to adopting the local association's contract and pooling methods.

The local association was the first in the United States to adopt the orderly marketing system on the basis of average prices for graded pools of similar grades, quality, and shrinkages. This plan has now been adopted by the Ohio association, and will be put into effect this year. The Ohio association is one of the oldest in the United States. The Pacific organization is preparing to handle double the amount of wool it handled last year.

WALLOWA MAPS DISTRIBUTED

As the result of offers of cooperation by the Union County Ad club and commercial organizations of Wallowa county, the Ad club headquarters here are now provided with folders descriptive of Wallowa county. The folders, among other interesting things, contain a road map of Eastern Oregon and Eastern Washington, giving road connections by the principal points in that territory. Mountain scenery and a picture of Wallowa lake are also included.

This material is being used chiefly as "stuffers" for the great volume of mail that goes out to people writing about information of roads across the mountains and will also be used with discrimination where people are asking information about Eastern Oregon in general.

CONTRACTS FOR WOOL NUMEROUS

Pacific Co-operative Association Reports Good Business

The Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers, which is now the largest wool marketing organization west of Chicago, has during April, received contracts from new members covering over 100,000 pounds of wool. The organization handled about 2,000,000 pounds from its old membership last year. These for the most part are voluntary members who were in the 1921 pool, of conversing with satisfied members who were in the 1921 pool. The new members are from Eastern Oregon, Washington and Idaho. The association's membership is now close to 2000 and the results of its 1921 wool sales averaged slightly higher than the average price received outside the association by non-members. Its handling costs were slightly less than usual warehouse rates, and the association was one of the three associations having the lowest per pound hauling cost of any of the cooperative wool marketing associations in the United States.
