

BATTLE GROUNDS WILL BE MARKED

SPOKANE, Wash., May 5.—Co-operation of historical and patriotic organizations of the Inland Empire is being sought by the Spokane chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, for the marking of three battle grounds near Spokane.

Attention of the organization was called by Rev. J. Neilson Barry to the fact that while hundreds of tourists know the site of the Custer massacre, few know the locations of the places where General Wright so subdued the northwestern Indians that lasting peace resulted, and without losing the life of a single American soldier.

"The battle of Four Lakes, September, 1858, might be designated as Battle Butte, and should be marked," said Rev. Mr. Barry. "The battle of Spokane Plains was a running fight of 14 miles, in which the Indians were the best runners but near Lyons station on the Great Northern is the point where the howitzers were unlimbered and the shells thrown in a group of Indians. This spot should be marked. East of Spokane, near Seston, is the spot where 800 Indian ponies were killed by the Wright command, giving a death blow to Indian power. This station, if called 'Horsekill,' would attract attention to the historic interest attached to the spot.

The suggestions of the Rev. Mr. Barry were embodied in a resolution which was unanimously adopted by the Spokane chapter.

ROAD CONDITIONS IN EASTERN OREGON

The following is a report of the condition of the state highways in Eastern Oregon, issued by the division engineer's office of the state highway commission today:

Old Oregon Trail.

Pendleton to foot of Cabbage Hill: Open; macadamized.

Foot of Cabbage Hill to Hilgard: Closed by snow.

Hilgard to La Grande: Open but very rough.

La Grande to Hot Lake: Pavement and macadam; good construction.

Hot Lake to Union—Open; short detours necessary. Cross track just east of Hot Lake, detour marked to main highway.

Union to Haines—Excellent macadam.

Haines to Baker—Macadam soft in spots, drive carefully.

Baker to Nelson—Fair county road.

Nelson to Huntington—New standard grade. The detours on this section are well marked, but care should be used as they are rough. Use chains.

Huntington to Wilder (via Olds Ferry)—Fair condition; Oregon side closed.

Wilder to Ontario—Excellent macadam.

La Grande-Joseph Highway.

La Grande to Island City—Paved.

Island City to Elgin—County road, open but rough. Drive carefully.

Elgin to Minam—First nine miles work.
