CAMPAIGN DATA IS REQUESTED

Senator Eberhard Issues Challenge to Opponent to Tell Facts of His Club.

Senator Colon R. Eberhard, candidate for the republican nomination for joint senator from Umatilla, Union and Morrow counties, has issued a statement in which he asks his opponent, R. J. Kitchen, to make public facts regarding his "Kitchen for Senator Club," and other matters relating to his campaigning. Mr. Eberhard's statement is as follows:

"Expenditure of money by a candidate for the legislature and his immediate family is limited by law to the sum of one hundred dollars. Mr. Kitchen has formed a club, its membership is an unregulated voter at La Grande not to my knowledge heretofore affiliated with the Republican party. Contributions are supposed to be made to such club, and the expenditures contracted and paid in its name. Mr. Kitchen has published six or more large display ads in various newspapers, costing in excess of twenty dollars each; has had printed ten thousand or more circulars at a cost of probably fifty dollars; has a 'campaign manager' who travels around the district spreading the circulars and the Kitchen gospel; and must have incurred other expenditures, including traveling expenses for himself and manager while traveling over the district. These items aggregate more than one hundred dollars. The public would doubtless be interested to know who is putting up the additional money to carry on his campaign. Accordingly, I hereby challenge Mr. Kitchen now to make public the names and addresses of those contributing to his campaign; also, to make public the names secured by his paid solicitors and claimed by him to constitute the 'Kitchen for Senator Club.' Kitchen and his satellites are the only known persons questioning the sincerity and loyalty of myself as a member of the 'Faithful Fourteen.' Let Kitchen tell the public whether large interests offended by me in my legislative career are not now financing his campaign of misrepresentation. In short, let Kitchen tell who is behind him. Will he do it?"
