ENLARGES ITS PHOTO ROOMS

The Red Cross Drug Store has just completed installing a new printing, developing and enlarging room that will increase their capacity for developing films one hundred per cent. The new prints are arranged in the rear of the store instead of the side and are much larger, giving more room and better lighting facilities. The new room is much better ventilated.

In the developing room large ventilation developing tanks have been installed that will handle ten rolls of film to the tank. In the same room is the drying compartment. The enlarging and printing rooms are now separate instead of combined as was formerly the case. The big drying machine is located outside.

DELL SNOWDE APPEALS CASE

NORTH POWDER, May 9.—Feeling that a prejudiced verdict was given against him, Dell Snowde appealed his case to the circuit court. When brought before Justice May for arraignment on the charge of having liquor on his person, for which charge the jury brought a verdict of guilty, Snowde was fined \$100 and cost, and given a thirty day jail sentence.

He immediately gave notice of appeal and bondsmen were asked to post \$250, same as in the first case when he was taken into custody.
