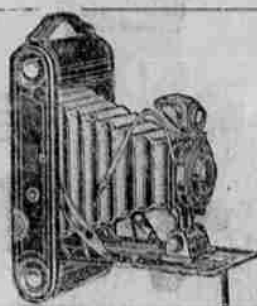
Mr. and Mrs. Shafer have been residents of La Grande for the past three years.
