TIMBERLANDS

A photoplay of remarkable dramatic intensity, "Strength of the Pines," produced by William Fox and starring William Russell will be shown at the Star theatre Saturday and Sunday. The timberlands of Oregon have been the scene of many crimes of violence—and not unnaturally so when one considers their commercial importance, their financial value, and the fact that some years ago they constituted approximately 57 per cent of the total land area. The value of the lumber and timber products of the state, which was \$6,530,000 in 1890, increased to \$19,577,000 in 1900, to \$12,484,000 in 1905, and have further increased steadily since these census figures were compiled.

The cupidity of criminal woodland owners was used with great skill by Edison Marshall in building his story "Strength of the Pines" on which the Russell picture is based.
