NEW TRIUMPH SCORED BY WILLIAM RUSSELL

William Russell, who is among the most popular of screen stars, scored a notable triumph today at the Star Theatre, where he opened for a two-day run in his latest William Fox picture, "Strength of The Pines." Russell always satisfies in his work; but it is to be said that in this production he has a story of unusual merit in plot and extraordinary dramatic force in development.
