CHARLIE HUNTER IS IN THE RACE

Former Union County Boy, Now Resident of Wallowa, Would Represent This District.

Charlie Hunter of Wallowa county is a brother to Albert R. Hunter of Union county, but, unlike Albert, who is a Democrat, Charlie is and always has been a Republican. In years gone by he decided that the Democratic party was not his choice, greatly to the disappointment of the Hunter family, and from his very first vote he has been supporting the protective tariff and other measures which Republicanism stands for.

Charlie was educated in the valley but at an early age removed to Wallowa county, where for several years he engaged in the mercantile business with the old M. & M. company. Later he went into the farming and live stock business and today is one of the heaviest taxpayers of Wallowa county.

NEARLY HALF MILLION PAID

Soldier Bonus Disbursements Now Over Four Hundred Thousand Mark.

SALEM, May 12.—Five more warrants were issued Tuesday in payment of loans granted by the bonus commission. This makes a total of 19 loans that have actually been paid, amounting in all to \$28,400. The commission at Tuesday's session approved 136 claims for the cash bonus, amounting to \$34,900 and 165 applications for loans, amounting to \$402,800. This brings the total of cash claims approved to date to 10,001, aggregating \$2,507,105 and, 796 loans aggregating \$1,791,500.

Some misunderstanding exists concerning the provisions of the law requiring the refund of educational aid in cases where the applicant desires the loan, according to Captain H. C. Brumbaugh, secretary of the commission. A number of applicants and some of the bonus attorneys are under the impression that the amount of educational aid received will be deducted from the amount of the loan approved by the commission, and that it will not have to be repaid to the state.

This is an erroneous impression, Captain Brumbaugh said. He said the law reads: "Any person who has received educational aid shall make a refund to the state of the amount so received before he shall be entitled to receive a loan or bonus under this act."

As an accommodation to applicants the commission has ruled that any educational aid received will be treated as a deduction on the voucher for such bonus or loan, but that this procedure in no way obviates the necessity of its repayment to the state.
