ALL STAR CAST IN "CAMERON OF THE ROYAL MOUNTED"

The story is intensely human, dealing with the trials and tribulations and steadfast love of Nell Sanders a girl of New York's East Side, for big Jim Platt. Nell loses her sweetheart job, but gets another in the luncheon of Hash House Sal. When the free lunch saloons turn out the penniless Jim he goes to Nell for a hand-out and as a result she is again without employment. Later she is dismissed as the scrubwoman of a saloon when Jim beats up the saloon-keeper's brother, for which he is sent to jail. Nell becomes a Salvation Army worker and when Jim gets out of prison, her devotion arouses his conscience, manhood and love.

AT SHERRY'S SUNDAY AND MONDAY

Hundreds of ex-service men were employed at Universal City, Cal., during the production of "Foolish Wives," the costly photodrama of Monte Carlo

to be shown at the Sherry Theatre. They were used to give—U. S. grad Sunday and Monday. They were used to give the proper soldier atmosphere as the famous Mediterranean pleasure resort, which also was a leave area of the Allied Armies during the winter following the armistice.

The American ex-service men include men and officers of all ranks from every branch of the army, navy, and marine corps. A large percentage of these ex-fighters actually had visited Monte Carlo, either on leave or as hospital patients. They were able to help the picture considerably in re-constructing the life and activities of the Riviera shortly after the war.

AT SHERRY'S TODAY AND TOMORROW "CALL OF HOME"

This is the day of thrills on the screen. Producers are working overtime trying to outdo one another in the development of big scenes to please the public. Novelty is the cry of the hour. "Give 'em thrills and still more thrills!" is the slogan from coast to coast.

So far as downright thrills are concerned it is doubtful if recent months have brought to notice a motion picture that quite matches "The Call of Home" in this respect. Filmed from George Agnew Chamberlain's novel, "Home," and directed by L. J. Gasnier, has been at work at the Hollywood studios of R-C Pictures for the last year or more, "The Call of Home" takes rank as one of the really big achievements of the year in filmdom. And especially is this so in regard to thrills, in which the production abounds.

Consider, for instance, the fact that the production embraces at least three distinct thrill scenes that rise far above the average. One depicts a flood and is done in most realistic fashion. The pictures were filmed in the valley of the Colorado River when that stream was swollen from storms and had overrun its banks and spread death and destruction for miles about. Imagine, for example, the thrills one gets when the big dam goes to pieces before the rush of billions of tons of water and Ramsey Wallace is pitched headlong off the structure and into the foaming maelstrom. Down stream he is carried amid the jagged rocks that jut up out of the water. Big stuff, this, every foot of it.

Then, too, there is another big thrill when the same Ramsey Wallace, paddling in a canoe, goes over a high waterfall and is catapulted out of the frail craft and into the water as the canoe is shattered on the rocks below. As if this were not enough, there is another big thrill when Irene Rich, as Alix, the wife, leaps from a moving express train at the risk of life and limb.
