WOOL CROP IS MOSTLY SOLD

PENDLETON, MAY 19.—The 1922 wool crop of this region, with the exception of three or four clips, has been sold, the date of sale being earlier this year than for many years in the past, say woolmen and buyers. The general price paid was from 28 to 30 for coarse wool and 35 for fine.

The sellers include Joe Cunha, J. E. Smith, Livestock Co., Dillard French, Mike Doherty, Jim Parley, John Kilkenny, Tom Gibson, S. M. Porter, L. P. Davidson, A. B. Chapman, Charles McDevitt, Phil Hiri, Frank Gilliland, the Smasher interests, Smythe Brothers, Cunningham Sheep Co. and K. G. Warner.

In the past it has been the custom of growers to wait until the wool sales in the latter part of May but this year the tendency to sell has been marked.

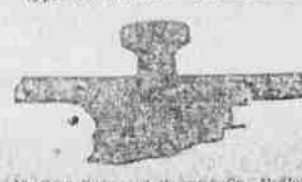

NEW APPARATUS AND DEVICES

A VERNIER VARIOMETER.

The radio experimenter seems to be demanding extremely fine adjustments at everything in a radio set. A vernier variometer is however something very novel indeed. Its advantages are of course quite apparent in certain types of circuits. The illustration shows the type which comes unmounted and may be used in the construction of a cabinet receiving set. The mounted type is exactly the same, except that it has a front and back support and binding posts for connections. Only the unmounted type

is shown, since the construction can best be seen in that type.

The vernier variometer is really a miniature of a regular variometer, with some slight constructional changes, in addition to size reduction. There are four single-layer coils, wound on small bakelite bobbins. The inductance range is equal to that obtained between two scale degrees on the usual type of variometer dial. The two upper coils are fixed in position and form the stator, while the two lower coils are mounted on a shaft and form the rotor. The shaft, which passes through a sleeve, has a bakelite knob mounted at its other end.

The use of such a vernier inductance adjustment eliminates all shunt capacities in a short wave regenerative receiver. It is the latest device for tuning and "holding" continuous waves after they are once tuned.
