The Screen

ABSOLUTE REALISM DEMANDED IN FILM

Monte Carlo Reproduced for "Foolish Wives."

Probably never before in the history of moving pictures has a film been made which entailed such a vast amount of detail as "Foolish Wives," the super-feature produced under the direction of Erich von Stroheim at Universal City, and which is to be shown at the Sherry Theatre Sunday and Monday.

Eighteen volumes devoted to description and illustrations of Monaco and Monte Carlo were brought by Lester Armstrong, the studio librarian, from Nice, France, for reference in securing the minutest details of the picturesque principality which the outside world knows chiefly for its sumptuous gambling casino.

The picture called for work on a set representing a suite in the Hotel de Paris at Monte Carlo for which the furniture and decorations were copied from actual photographs, while the towers, bedspreads, napkins and other items were embroidered with the exact name of the hotel. This conformity to detail is typical of that observed for the entire film.

In one particular set representing a view of Monte Carlo from the sea, it was necessary to have majestic rows of cypress trees to partly conceal the pretentious structures from the Mediterranean. To complete this scene eighty cypress trees were ordered by von Stroheim to be transplanted from Del Monte to Monterey.

Twenty thousand square feet of lawn were transplanted from the front lawn of the studio to the back ranch for the Monte Carlo set to lend general attractiveness to the scene.

A caravan of 800 people journeyed from the studio to Monterey at one time for the production of some of the most interesting scenes in the whole film. Bridges, terraces, roads and woods were built up to make this gigantic scene true to the original. The English actor, writer and traveler, Frank Elliott, who is also a friend of the director, von Stroheim, when shown some of the rushes of the film, declared that the Monte Carlo atmosphere was perfect in every detail and that anyone who did not know the picture was made in California, would surely be under the impression that the scenes were taken at the famous resort on the Mediterranean.

Detail to type when picking his cast is another reason for the marked realism of the film and though it meant many hours of patient toil and thinking on his part, von Stroheim personally chose every person who had the slightest connection with the picture. Extensive searching and observation were necessary for this task as the foreign types needed were very scarce and hard to obtain in Los Angeles.

The women and girls used in the

scenes which called for evening just as thoroughly as the average clothes were instructed to bring their gowns with them, previous to their being engaged, and displayed themselves in full dress and make-up, for the personal supervision of the director. As 500 people were used at one time, this detail alone took several days. It is easy to understand why "Foolish Wives" took eighteen months to complete.

CONWAY TEARLE AT ARCADE SUNDAY.

"A Wide-Open Town," Selznick Picture starring Conway Tearle, which is the attraction at the Arcade Theatre Sunday only, at once suggests the gambling story. Those who see the photograph, however, will discover that the gambling interest is by no means paramount.

Conway Tearle, star of "A Wide-Open Town," has always been greatly admired by photoplay devotees for the reason that he is rarely, if ever, seen in the idyllic roles which are so often entrusted to male screen stars. In "A Wide-Open Town" the character he portrays is one which will appeal to every man and woman who has learned from bitter experience that expected perfection in human nature scarcely ever materializes. It is a typical Tearle characterization in that the star stands out first and foremost as an actor and not so much because a kind Providence has given him a comely face and figure and the intelligence and training to wear his clothes well. The direction of the picture is by Ralph Ince whose work for the Selznick company has recently been attracting unusual attention.

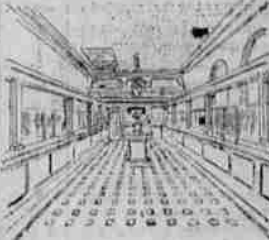
