THOUSANDS TO BE IN UNIFORM

The Dalles Making Preparations for Parade of 5,000 Service Men During State Convention.

THE DALLES, May 22.—Five thousand ex-service men in uniform is the goal set for the annual convention parade on July 29th, the biggest civic feature of the state meeting of the American Legion, according to plans being worked out by the local convention committee. In order to get the idea thoroughly home in the minds of Legion men over the state the local committee has launched upon an extensive advertising and publicity program which will reach, within a few days, into every town in the state. Thousands of big posters, laid enough to be seen a block away, have just been prepared, and they are being dispatched by the publicity committee. These set forth the salient points of the tri-convention program, the state meetings of the legion, its auxiliary and the society of forty and eight, and they are being sent forth this week.

SACRAMENTO IS TRANSFORMED

Celebration Next Week Will Find City Looking as it Did in the Days of '49.

SACRAMENTO, Calif., May 22.—Visitors to the "Days of '49" celebration in Sacramento May 23 to 25 will be greeted by the novel sight of a modern city made to appear as it was more than seventy years previous. The transformation is rapidly nearing completion. Men, women and children will be dressed as their parents were. Methods of transportation will be changed. Even the store fronts will resemble the rude structures of pioneer days.

While the program for the six days teams with action and unusual features, the city itself presents a "show" worth a trip across the continent.

The celebration committee today announced a general program for the week. A battle on the streets, between Indians and goldmen will be the opening feature. It will mark the founding of Sacramento. In the afternoon a reception will be tendered the California landmarks headed by Mayor James Ralph of San Francisco, and the old locomotive, one of the first put into service on the first transcontinental railroad will again be operated by the original engineer, John E. Loneragan, now a millionaire manufacturer of Philadelphia, and the fireman, Tom O'Connell, retired railroad employee of Sacramento.

Wednesday, the second day, will be Pioneer and Fraternal Day, featuring the pioneers of California. In the afternoon the \$20,000 wild west contest will start at the State Fair Grounds the unparalleled collection of riders including Tom Mix, famous movie cowboy and his entire company.

Thursday will be "California Day," scores of communities participating through arrangements made by the California Development Association. In the evening the Governor's Ball, and "Best Harts Night" for the newspapermen will be the features.

On Friday the great "Gold Rush Parade" will pass through the streets of the city, more than 50,000 persons in '49 costumes, and several hundred floats and old-time vehicles being in the line.

The whickerinos will hold sway on Saturday. Five thousand strong, these civic-spirited men will show to the world the whicker crops which they have grown especially for the celebration.

Not overlooking the religious phase of the early days, an automobile pilgrimage will leave on Sunday morning for the old church at Coloma where services will be held. Special services will also be held at Sacramento's first church, which is located a block from the mining town.

Scores of other features will be woven into the program including championship shooting events, typical of '49, illuminated aerial displays, old fiddlers' contests, and the Mining Town with its many unique features including the two longest beards in the world—Hans Hingst, of North Dakota, 17 feet, and Z. T. Wilcox, of Nevada, 12 feet.

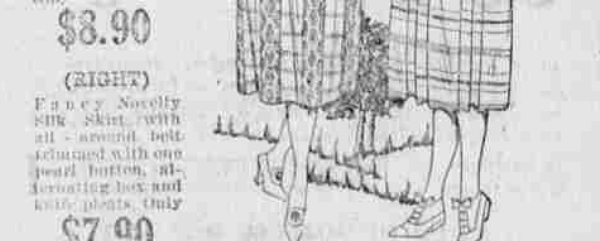
