AGED COVE MAN DIED ON SUNDAY

COVE, May 23.—After a long period of ill health Minor A. Milman died at the family home on Sunday. He had been ill the greater part of the winter but on election day was able to go to the polls to cast his vote. But the same evening was stricken with paralysis, from which he did not recover, dying on Sunday. He was an old soldier, being in the 30th volunteers, enlisting first for three months, then for three years, and afterwards for the duration of the war. He was at Richmond, Virginia, when Lee surrendered. Mr. Milman was born in Livingston county, New York, August 25, 1836. Besides his wife he leaves four daughters and two sons to mourn his loss.
