Head Man of M. G. Barnes Circus Enjoys Luncheon and Pays High Tribute to La Grande's People.

Rex De Russell, of the M. G. Barnes circus, who is in the city today making arrangements for the show, which is to be here May 30th, was a guest of honor at the Tuesday Ad Club luncheon today and he marvelled at the close communion of business men of the county, paying the highest possible tribute to the organization and to La Grande as a good town, a good circus town and a town where the same spirit predominates.

"I travel over the entire United States," said Mr. De Russell, "and I say to you truthfully that La Grande is an outstanding community in the way of community spirit and team work on the part of her citizens." show my nomination. It will be time enough after the canvass to decide on the question of asking a recount if such steps are necessary," he said.

PORTLAND, May 23.—With complete returns from 36 counties tabulated and one precinct missing from Baker county, 15 from Harney and about one-third of the vote of Malheur county unreported, Governor Olcott had a lead of 365 for the republican nomination for governor today at noon.

Olcott had 42,798 and Chas. Hall of Coos Bay had 42,433. The Portland Telegram, which supported Olcott, definitely claimed his nomination today. The Telegram declared that the unreported precincts would increase the governor's lead.

PORTLAND, May 23.—Thirty counties complete with a few precincts missing from the remaining six counties gave Olcott 42,798 votes and Hall 42,433.

PORTLAND, May 23.—In Malheur county, where on the partial returns Olcott has 298 and Hall 76, there was about one-half of the vote yet to be counted last night. The estimate of the county clerk of Malheur county is that Olcott will have fully 50 majority over Hall in that county.

There are still 15 precincts to hear from in Harney county, where on the incomplete count the vote stands, Olcott 112, Hall 23.

It is possible that the canvasses yet to come by county boards and the canvass by the secretary of state will disclose some errors—increases or decrease the indicated lead for Olcott, but it is not believed probable that the official canvass can disturb the main result.

There is, however, already talk of a probable demand for recount. The Hall supporters are said not to be satisfied that the Multnomah county ballots have been correctly tallied, and they are said to be investigating a rumor that reservation Indians were voted in Umatilla county. They may ask for recounts there and elsewhere, but are awaiting the official canvass before taking action.
