morrow afternoon.

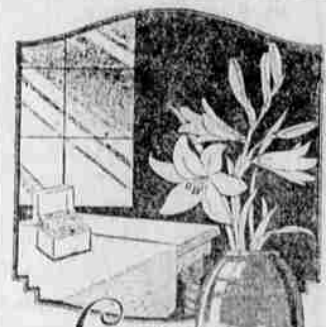
The Kaffee Klatch will meet Fri-
