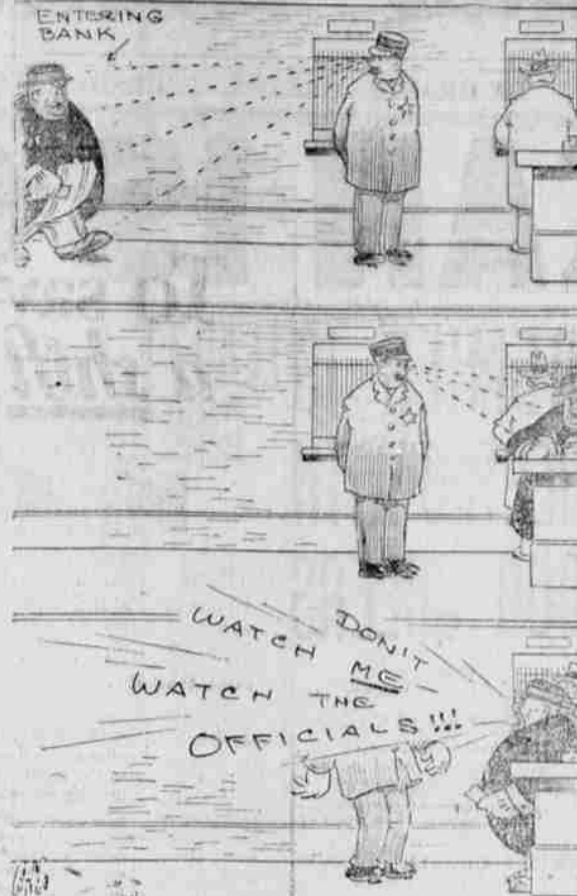

TRAGIC OPENING.

RICHMOND, Va., May 24.—During the opening here Monday of the Virginia historical pageant, depicting the state's founding and development, Capt. James Pollard, commander of the Richmond Howitzers, dropped dead from his horse in one part of the procession, and about the same time Governor E. Lee Trinkle's mount became frightened by the firing of a cannon and ran away. Six members of the naval training band of Hampton Roads were run down by the governor's horse and injured, one seriously. Mr. Trinkle was not hurt.

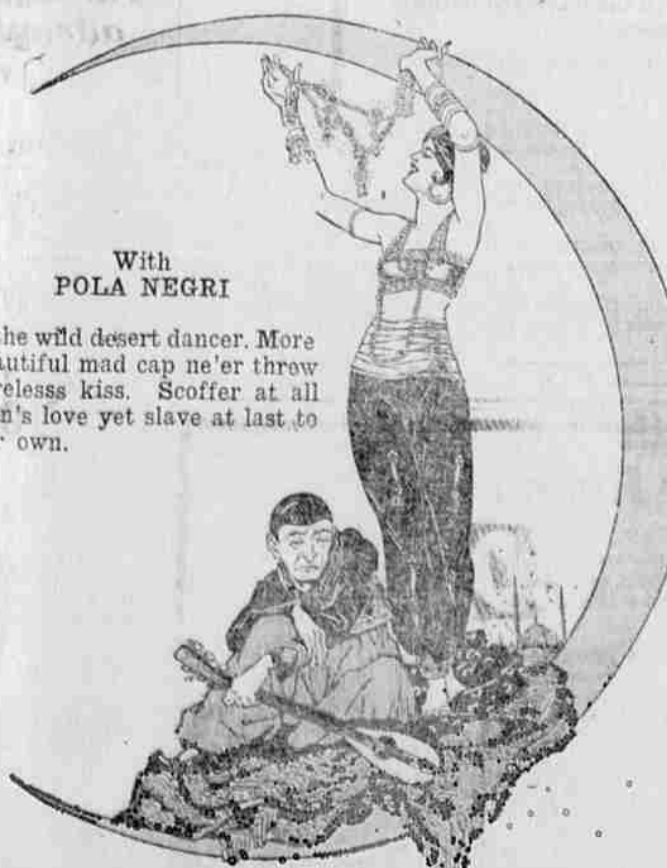
