

JAIL NO PLACE FOR FLAPPERS

BEDFORD, N. Y., May 25.—Flapper tendencies among the inmates of Bedford state reformatory for women were curtailed sharply Sunday by promulgation of 17 rules, putting a new interpretation on what is lost with the relinquishment of personal freedom.

Those inmates who would indulge the cosmetic urge, the rules say, must do so without the aid of brushes, powder puffs and eyebrow pencils. The rules ban, among other things, bloomers, roll-down hose, low-neck dresses, and except in restricted areas, curl papers. They also rule against gossiping and restrict exhibitions of fancy garters and boudoir caps.

Explaining the necessity for the rules, Superintendent Baker said: "They take the same pains in dressing and beautifying themselves here as they would for an Easter parade in Fifth avenue."

DRINKING HAS BEEN LESSENER

BOSTON, May 25.—Drinking among college students has diminished materially since the Eighteenth amendment was enacted, and in a majority of colleges drinking has practically disappeared, according to the president of the Meadville Theological school, in his report of an investigation made Monday to the Unitarian Temperance society.

A circular letter was sent to the deans of 486 American colleges. The tenor of the 480 replies was overwhelmingly that there had been a marked decrease in the past year. "In the vast majority of American colleges the drink problem has ceased to exist," the report said.
