FOUR GRADUATES FROM COUNTY

OREGON'S AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Oregon, May 25.—The greatest number of graduates in the history of the college—416—are candidates for graduation Monday, June 5. Since six will receive two degrees each in pharmacy and one degree in both home economics and vocational education, 423 degrees are to be conferred. A record number of degrees issued previously is the number of last year—340.

The Union county graduates in the record class number four, two boys and two girls. Union furnishes three of the graduates and La Grande one. None of the other towns in the county are represented in the class of '22.

Alfred Oswald, of La Grande, is seeking a degree in commerce. He is one of the prominent members of the rising generation in La Grande and is a graduate of the La Grande high school. He is a son of M. and Mrs. B. F. Oswald.

Miss Georgia Wright of Union, is seeking a degree in home economics and Miss Mary Crocker is taking the same subject. The third of the Union trio is J. Kenneth Ford, who is majoring in science and will receive a degree of master of science.

A large number of Union county students will be represented in the graduation classes in the coming few years than this semester as the number attending O. A. C. from this section has grown by leaps and bounds in the past three years.

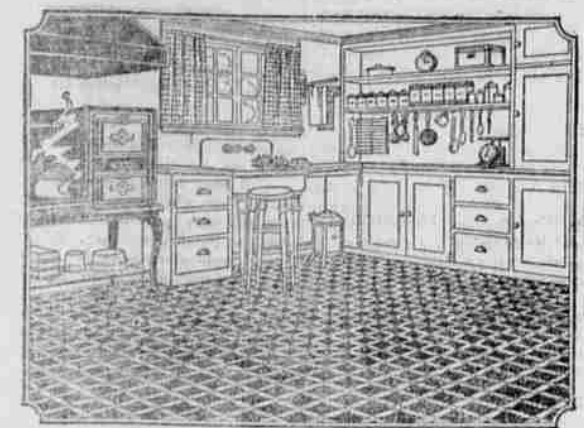

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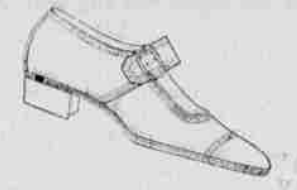
