RIGHT TIME TO PLANT COWPEAS

Wait Until Soil Is Thoroughly Warm and Danger of Cold Weather Has Passed.

PLAN FOR SEED PRODUCTION

Most Practical Method is to Use Ordinary Grain Drill—Sow Broadcast or in Drill Rows for Forage or Green Manuring.

Cow peas should not be sown until the soil has become thoroughly warmed and all danger of cold weather is past. After that time they can be sown whenever moisture conditions are favorable. When sown in cold, wet soil, cowpeas seed will either rot or give a poor stand of unhealthy plants. The latest date for profitable sowing, however, is at least 30 days before the first killing frost.

The time of sowing will depend largely upon the purpose for which the crop is grown. If grown for seed or hay, the seed should be sown shortly after the corn crop. For green manuring, pasturing or hay, cowpeas can be sown as late as the first of August in the South will make considerable growth. When cowpeas are to follow wheat or oats, they should be sown at the earliest possible moment after the crop is cut.

Rate of Sowing.
The best method for the production of seed is to sow in rows about three feet apart, with the seeds from two to three inches apart in the row. Although a corn planter may be used for sowing in this way, the most practical method is to use the ordinary grain drill, stopping part of the grain cups so as to leave the rows about three feet apart and setting the drill the same as when sowing about two bushels of wheat to the acre.

When cowpeas are grown for forage or green manuring the seeds are sown broadcast or in drill rows six to eight inches apart. The grain drill set to sow about one and one-half bushels of wheat to the acre will be found most satisfactory. If grown for silage with corn, the corn and cowpeas can be sown in one operation, using the ordinary corn planter. If cowpeas are sown in corn at the last cultivation, the common practice is to sow the seeds broadcast at the rate of 1 to 1½ bushels to the acre and cover them with a cultivator.

Another Method.
Another method is to sow with a one-horse wheel drill at the rate of about 45 pounds to the acre, sowing two or three rows of cowpeas between the rows of corn. Cowpeas and corn are sometimes sown thickly together for hay with excellent results, using about one-half to one bushel of corn and one bushel of cowpeas to the acre. However, when corn makes a very heavy growth cowpeas will not give very good results on account of the shade and lack of moisture.

The quantity of seed to be sown to the acre varies according to the method of sowing. With rows 24 to 30 inches apart, about 20 to 40 pounds of seed to the acre will be required. When sown broadcast for hay, green manuring or silage about 15 pounds of seed to the acre will be ample.

USING TEMPORARY PASTURES

One Advantage for Sheep Raising Is Improvement of Soil, Especially With Legumes.

One advantage in using temporary pastures for sheep raising is the improvement of the soil, say specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. The greatest demand upon the soil is avoided by not requiring the crops to mature seed. All the manure is distributed upon the ground, together with all uncut parts of the crop. With legume forages the gain to the soil is especially valuable and allows production of still larger crops which are again returned to the land diminished only by the materials contained in the increased size of lambs or ewes while on that particular crop.

It is contended by Buchtel's friends, however, that word has come to them to the effect that many ballots, where the voters had voted in favor of the Buchtel recall but at the same time had voted for him as a recall candidate, had been thrown out and not counted by the judges on the theory that they were irregular.

It is probably a fact that much confusion obtained among the voters in regard to the recall ballots, and also that some of the election judges were confused in regard to them. Some voters had the idea that when voting for the recall they should also vote for Buchtel to complete the declaration of their intention to remove him from office, when, in fact, such a vote tended to retain him in office.

Some of the judges are reported, on the other hand, to have held the opinion that the voter casting his ballot in favor of the recall could not vote against Buchtel without invalidating the ballot.

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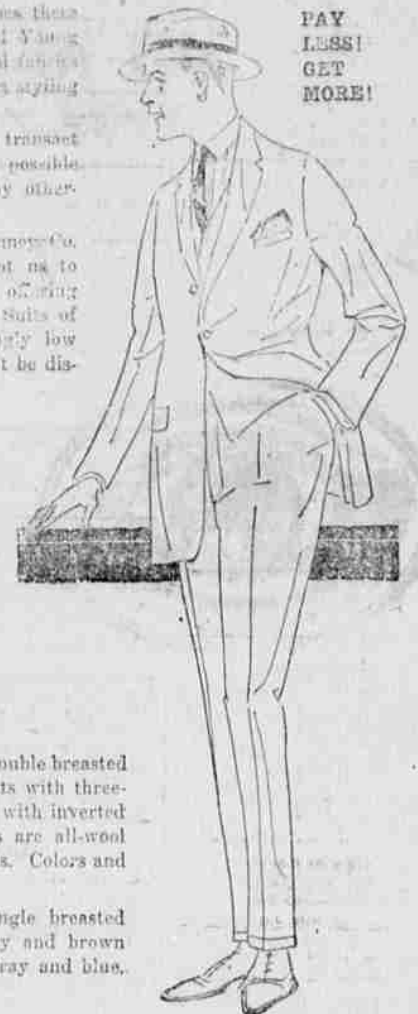

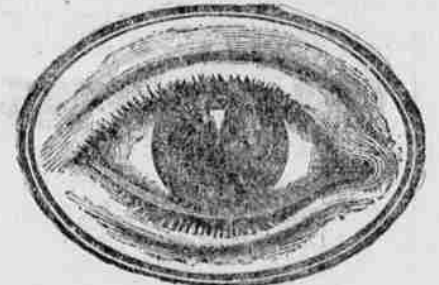
