BASEBALL NOT COMMERCE

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Organized baseball is not interstate commerce and clubs are not liable under the Sherman anti-trust law, the supreme court held today in deciding against the Baltimore club of the defunct federal league and set aside a verdict of the District of Columbia supreme court awarding the Baltimore club \$240,000 damages.

TWO INJURED IN ACCIDENT

DOUGHNUTS
