DRAMA SCHOOL IS ORGANIZED

PASADENA, Cal., May 29— Practical instruction for the training of directors of community drama will be offered at this year's session of the Summer Art Colony, conducted here annually by the Pasadena Community Playhouse association.

To meet an increasing demand for persons equipped to undertake this work, courses will be available in play presentation, stagecraft, dramatic dancing, training of the speaking voice, history of the drama, costume designing, psychology and organization of the community playhouse.

The faculty will be headed by Dr. Margaret S. Carhart, of the Southern Branch of the University of California, as at Los Angeles, and Gilmer Brown, director of the Pasadena Community Playhouse.

Seven others who will assist are Arthur Farwell, composer, First Fellow, Pasadena Music and Art association; F. C. Huxley, state manager, Pasadena Community playhouse; Belle Northrup, Teacher's College, Columbia University; H. D. Stechan, general manager, Pasadena Community Playhouse; Eloise Sterling, assistant director, Pasadena Community Playhouse; and Evelyn Thomas and Beulah Wardell, of the Southern Branch of the University of California.

The Summer Art Colony is a civic enterprise and is not conducted for profit and the tuition fees are nominal. Instruction will begin the last Monday in June and will continue for six weeks.

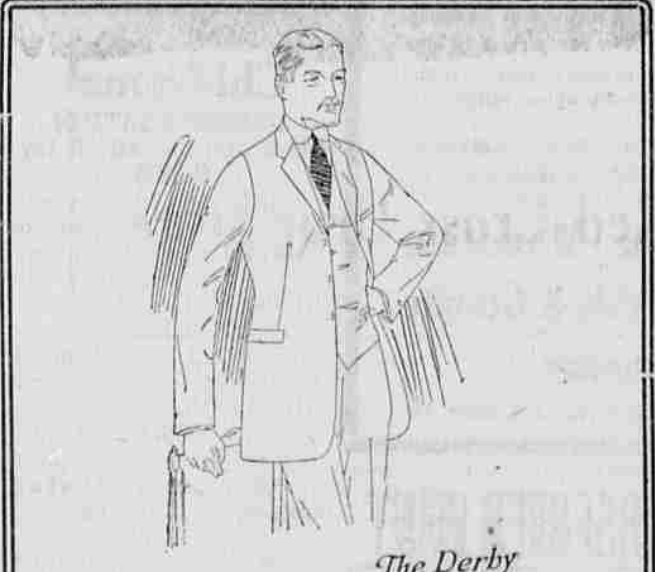
