and Eastern Oregon. While there was nothing of the dramatic in his nature, yet he possessed that earnestness of purpose and sincerity of character which made him an outstanding character and a man whose advice was often sought. He stood for the better things for advancement, for law enforcement and he impressed these features of his character on the community.

Samuel Cochran was born in Wapello county, Iowa, May 17, 1846; was married to Louisa Jane Ruckman on November 29, 1868. His wife passed on August 29, 1910, since which time the lifetime partner has led the lonely life which the taking of the mate of youth brings. The deceased arrived in Union county June 7, 1872, where he engaged in farming, following this vocation in a way that built up an excellent land holding in this valley. He retired from active farming in 1898. Three children survive him. They are: Mrs. Mary M. Cople, of Portland; Charles E. Cochran, assistant general manager for the Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company of Portland; and George T. Cochran, state water superintendent and a member of the law firm of Cochran & Eberhard of La Grande. Three brothers, Rufus and William, of Seymour Iowa, and Milton D. of Starbuck, Washington, and a sister, Mrs. Florence Johnson, of Seymour, Iowa, are also living. The deceased was blessed with eight grandchildren in whom his later life was centered.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Secretary Hoover today assumed responsibility for fixing a reasonable price on spot coal during the continuation of the coal strike. In opening the conference here today to union and non-union operators, Hoover declared that any agreement between operators looking toward the fixing of the price of coal, even though in the interest of the public, would be illegal.

He asked, therefore, that the individual operators agree with him upon a reasonable price for coal in their respective districts.
