ANGLERS TURN EYES TO BAKER

The followers of Isaac Walton are now turning their eyes longingly towards Wallowa and Baker counties, where, according to reports, the fishing is much better than in Union county. Eagle and Pine creeks, in Baker county, are drawing many of the local anglers and reports of good sized catches are being turned in daily.

Along the Wallowa river and also in other streams in Wallowa county, the members are being caught in considerable quantities.

Ladd Creek and Little Creek, in Ladd canyon and northeast of Union, respectively, are not as much in favor as earlier in the season. Ladd creek is practically fished out and Little Creek "aint what it used to be." Catherine Creek, the mecca of Eastern Oregon anglers in the summer, is still too high to furnish any good fishing and from the present outlook, it will be two or three weeks before the creek is at its best. Most of the other streams in Union county are either getting pretty well fished out or are still too high to permit good fishing.


