## FUNERAL HELD AT SUMMERVILLE

SUMMERVILLE, June 2.—The funeral of Donald Roderick McKenzie was held in the chapel Thursday, May 25. The services were conducted by Rev. W. F. Shields of Wallowa. Mr. McKenzie was born April 29, 1861, in Stark county, Illinois, and died May 24, 1922, at his home in Wallowa, Oregon, at the age of 61 years and 26 days. When three years old his parents crossed the plains and settled in the Grande Ronde Valley at Summerville, where he lived for 30 years. He moved to Wallowa in 1906. In 1915 he returned to the Grande Ronde valley again, but was not satisfied and went back to Wallowa in 1921, where he resided until the time of his death. His occupation was that of a farmer. Thirty-two years ago he was married to Miss Cora Davis and to this union 11 children were born, two of whom are dead. He is survived by his wife and the following children: Ray, Mrs. Edith Plass, Orville, Vern, Donald, Clarence, Clayton and Max, who are living in Wallowa, Oregon, and Mrs. Maude Pearl Stites, Idaho. He was not identified with any church but was considered a believer in Jesus Christ as the Son of God. He is called comparatively at an early age to take up the duties that are his in the unseen and, we believe, happier and better world. May we emulate in our lives the things we admired in him and be heady through faith in Jesus Christ to render our account with joy when we too are called by the Angel of Death.
