New Fire Reported in Colville National Forest and in Deschutes Section; Damage Not Increased.

PORTLAND, June 2.—The forest fire situation in Washington and Oregon is greatly improved. Fires in western Washington are subsiding and while the blaze was reported continuing in Skamania and Klickitat counties, no further damage was reported there.

A new fire is reported in the Colville national forest burning on Deer creek. The fire has swept over 1200 acres just outside the Deschutes national forest.

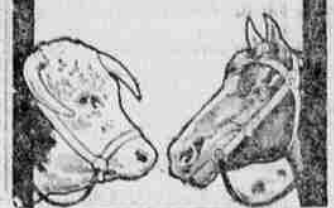

TWENTIETH YEAR BOOKLET ISSUED

J. C. Penney Company Presents Illustrated History of Business to Its Patrons.

To be born on the desert amid the sage brush with very ordinary conditions as a business background; to grow in twenty years to such extent that it enters the business life of twenty-seven states with 312 individual stores is the remarkable record of a man with an idea achieved in this good old U. S. A., where people insist the day of opportunity passed when the free lands were all taken up and the buffalo vanished from the plains.

The history of a business plan conceived at Kemmerer, Wyoming, by J. C. Penney is given in the company's artistic booklet which is now being circulated among the patrons of the different stores in the United States and it is a very interesting story. Success has been achieved almost as if by magic, but when analyzed there is nothing of a magic nature about it. Mr. Penney had an idea that was good; he bought good talent to help him put it in operation; he kept his head and did not swell up with his first success, but his feet remained firmly on the ground. Result: One of the largest chain store enterprises established and operating that the country has ever known.

The lesson for the high school graduate in the success of the Penney movement is that Mr. Penney did not have to go to New York or Boston or some other large city to get his start. He got it on the bleak plains of Wyoming, where not even nature smiled upon him; where the sage brush is dry and brittle, where the sand blows in clouds; where in winter the snow races across the plains at a speed never yet recorded; where there is absolutely nothing in surroundings to promote or nurture anything. Yet in this little cold town, in the little hut he called a store building this chap worked out a plan that has been a national success. Of course, the idea finally got to New York but when it did it was carried on the shoulders of the investors who sought it in order to get an interest financially. The large crop of young people now graduating could have no better address delivered to them than "J. C. Penney and What He Has Done."
