An ice making plant, with a capacity of twenty tons, will be one of the features of the new quarters. Ice of the highest quality will be made for the plants consumption.

With the change the retail department will be roomier and will permit greater service and efficiency to the general public.

The wholesale department will have on its payroll over twenty men. All of the employees will be skilled local men. The manager has not yet been selected. The La Grande may be justly proud of this enlarged and strictly modern establishment.

from the trees of the forest.

The mill is equipped with heavy steam power and every automatic feature of the modern sawmill, including the steam "nigger," "shotgun" feed, live rolls that carry the sawed board to the edger, and then carries it on the piling device.

A large pond has been made by throwing a dam across the creek which furnishes an abundance of water for all purposes. At present not only is the pond full of logs but several million feet are cut and piled in convenient places.

Logging Operations Easy.

Nature seems to have taken quite a hand in arranging a suitable location for the saw mill. On three sides of it the mountains are high and the standing timber is all on plateaus so that the logs can be hauled to the crest of the ridge.

and shot down into the pocket where the mill stands. In this way transportation of logs is made very simple and easy.

After the lumber is sawed and piled trucks haul it from the mills to planer and box factory on the railroad where it is worked up to the most scientific manner to get the most out of every board.

Lumber Business Looks Brighter. In speaking of the lumber business for the future President Moore said: "It is here right now, the great demand for lumber is upon us and for the next ten or fifteen years the northwest, and especially the pine sections, will witness one of the most prosperous eras ever known. Our orders are piling up and we are working almost night and day to get things in shape to increase our output. I can see nothing but an exceptionally rosy future for the lumber trade."

Plant La Grande Asset. With the moving off of the new lumber company into the commercial field a large payroll has been established and it is a payroll that will find its way to La Grande. Opening up of the timber belt which this company is doing means a market for a product that heretofore was dormant.

It is one of several industries that casts a halo of prosperity around this city and one that every citizen is decidedly interested in, if not surely indirectly.

The afternoon session opened with song service and scriptural quotations led by Mrs. Wilgerodt, of Enterprise, followed by a splendid talk on "Class Grading and Promotion," by Miss Parker. The committee on resolutions and nomination reported and an election of officers was held.

W. F. Shields, of Wallowa, belonging to the Presbyterian church, was elected president; R. C.
