## BEAUTIFUL PARK IN PATAGONIA

Argentine Government Sets Aside Scenic Wonderland as a National Park.

(By Associated Press) BUENOS AIRES, June 7.—Snow-capped mountains, glaciers, azure lakes, tumbling rivers and foaming cascades are among the beauties of a great national park which the Argentine government has just set aside from public land in Patagonia.

The park has an area of nearly 2,000,000 acres. It is situated mostly in the territory of Neuquen, on the Chilean border and takes in foot hills and mountains of the Andes, including some of the volcanic peaks. A "hole" of it has never been explored.

In the center of it lies a lake as large as Lake Champlain, called Nahuel Huapi, over which tower majestic mountains and offering a marvelous panorama of scenery. Dozens of other lakes, large and small, lie ruffled among the valleys, some of which have probably never been disturbed even by the paddle of an Indian canoe. The region has been described as one of the most enchanting but little known parts of the world.

The park will soon be approached by a state railroad, almost completed which will terminate at Bariloche. Already, however, the beauty of the scenery and the spirit of adventure have for some years been attracting travelers to the region who have not been discouraged by the long horse-back or rough automobile journey necessary to get there. Now chalets, hotels, automobile roads and bridle paths are being planned for the park to accommodate the flow of tourists which is expected with the completion of the railroad.
