ANITA STEWART SCORES IN "INVISIBLE FEAR"

Tense drama, filled with suspense, thrills and excellent acting. "THE SEA LION" THRILLS WITH REAL HEART APPEAL

Awakened to the realization that the girl he has sent to destruction is his own daughter, Neils Nelson, captain of "The Lair," is aroused to heroic efforts to effect her rescue. And despite the fact that one of the worst storms of the year is raging, the man who has never known defeat takes on the elements for a finish fight.

This is a situation that marks a climax in "The Sea Lion," distributed by Associated First National Pictures, Inc., in which Robert Bosworth is starred at the Star Theatre Saturday and Sunday. In the title role, Bosworth is given a powerful character delineation that has never been equaled since the days of "The Sea Wolf," and is, according to many critics who have viewed the picture, at least on a par with Jack London's famous character.
