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ENTERPRISE LAD HIGHLY HONORED

ENTERPRISE, Or., June 9.—To an Oregon boy, William B. Ault of Enterprise, has come the honor of winning the highest honors of the year at the United States Naval academy at Annapolis. Ault received his diploma Friday, June 2, and will be one of the few to receive a commission in the navy.

In addition he was one of the five graduates from the academy to receive from Rear Admiral Henry B. Wilson, a special letter of commendation, as provided in the regulations. The superintendent is authorized to give this honor to six graduates in each class, but this year selected only five, of whom Ault was one.

The midshipman had the further distinction of having the company of which he is captain win the honor of carrying the regimental colors next year. This honor is awarded for general excellence in all details of drill and class room attainment. Ault was captain of the basketball team and the star of the quintet. He was graduated from the Enterprise high school and enlisted in the navy early in the World war. Before peace was declared he won his position as a student in the academy on appointment of Senator George E. Chamberlain. After a cruise in South Atlantic and Pacific waters this summer he will return to Annapolis and will serve as basketball coach next year. He is a son of Dr. and Mrs. C. A. Ault of Enterprise, where he has lived virtually all his life.

APPLE CROP TO BE SMALLER IS INDICATION NOW

These counties last year and 10 counties is the estimate for this year. Early indications were that the pear crop would be very heavy in 1922, the first estimates in the Medford district placing the crop at double that of 1921. But there was a very heavy drop during the latter part of May, in all of the heavy producing sections. Both the apple and pear crop must yet go through the "June drop," hence may be considerably reduced from the above estimates. It is not believed that the actual state production will be much in excess of the above estimates, even with favorable growing conditions.

In the Willamette valley the apple crop prospect is variously estimated at 60 to 75 per cent of a normal crop. Some young orchards are expected to produce considerably in excess of last year. The bloom was unusually light on some varieties, and the blooming period was unusually short. In the Rogue and Umpqua district the crop prospect appears to be about 60 per cent of normal. The Hood River and Wasco county district has a prospect of practically as many apples as last year, according to well informed orchardists. Umatilla county had the "worst spring frost in 15 years," and the Milton Freewater apple crop is now locally estimated at about 40 per cent of last year. Union county will probably have a somewhat smaller crop than the heavy one last year. Baker and Malheur promise about the same apple crop as last year.

More or less frost injury to the strawberry is reported from all of the eastern Oregon sections, including Hood River. The Umatilla injury is placed as high as 75 per cent by some growers. The Willamette valley crop is rather heavily set with considerable new acreage in bearing. Marketing of the 1922 crop has been under way in the earlier producing sections for about two weeks. Local grown berries will probably be quite plentiful in most Oregon markets about June 10th.

Market prospects for small fruits are much more favorable than at this time last year. The canner demand last year at the opening of the season, was very light, and considerable strawberry acreage was not picked. Loganberries opened last year at a very low figure. Right now contracts are being offered for practically all small fruits at better figures than prevailed three weeks ago, which in turn, were considerably better than those of last year.

FIRST NIGHT FLIGHT MADE

PARIS, June 8.—The first aerial round-trip flight at night between Paris and London was negotiated Wednesday night by an airplane carrying 10 passengers. The flight was attempted for the purpose of proving that night commercial and passenger traffic by air between the two cities is feasible.

Strong lights have been installed along the route, and the terminal aerodromes are illuminated with a brilliance approaching that of daylight. The machine left the terminal aerodrome at Le Bourget at 10 p. m., arrived at Orly at 1 a. m., left for Le Bourget at 2:50 a. m., and landed at 6:05. The return trip was slower because of a fog encountered en route.
