"Laundress of Souls"



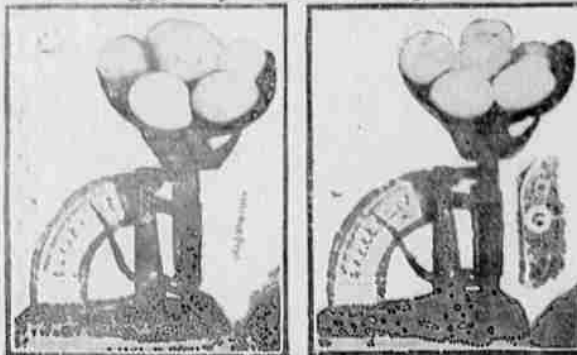
