INDUSTRY IS PICKING UP
(By Associated Press)
WARKAW, June 13.—Official figures published today by the Polish Ministry of Trade and Commerce revealed the fact that the cotton industry in Lodz during the first three months of 1922 surpassed the pre-war output. Export to western Europe, the Ministry's report shows, is on the increase, due largely to the importation of American raw materials.
Lodz is the largest cotton manufacturing center in Continental Europe, and second only to Manchester, England, in factory installations.

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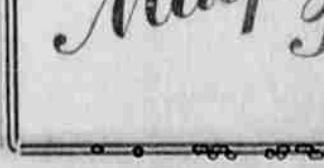

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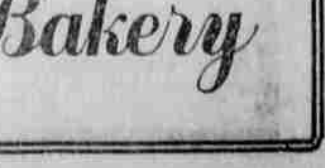
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
