## Four L Mills Raise Pay of Their Men Five Cents An Hour

SPOKANE, Wash., June 12.—An advance of five cents an hour, the first wage increase for more than two years, was voted by the directors of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen for districts nine and ten, comprising eastern Washington and northern Idaho, at a meeting here today. The increase, which affects mill employes only, will fix the minimum wage for common labor at \$5.49 a day instead of \$3 at present.  
Seventeen mills employing 5500 men are directly affected but it was stated that the increase probably will be met by some 33 smaller mills in the two districts not affiliated with the organization. The mills represented, it was said, produce 70 per cent of the lumber manufactured in the district.  
The increase becomes effective June 16.

## Range Men Quarrel One Shot To Death

CANYON CITY, June 12.—T. Arthur Jones was shot to death yesterday at 4 p. m. by George Smith, a sheepherder for Blainy & Clough, near Monument, Or. The shooting occurred as a result of a dispute over range matters.  
Smith came to Monument, Or., and gave himself up to Deputy Sheriff Leslie and was brought to Canyon City this morning. He said he shot in self-defense. He was badly bruised on the fact.

made. The ardent delegates asked the court if urgent measures might not be taken to procure the special election at an early date as possible.  
In reply the court announced that it would be necessary to first have the road surveyed by an approved engineer and all right-of-ways secured, before the matter could be further taken up. And right there the visitors showed just how bad they wanted the road.

Mayor Trippier stated that in regards to the right-of-way that he was fully convinced that every person on the road would sacrifice parts of his land, as much as necessary, free of charge for the right-of-way. What they wanted was the road as early as possible and they were willing to do all that they could to rush the completion.  
As to the surveying of the road, considerable discussion was held on this matter. The visiting delegation were eager to have the thing done as early as possible and one of them suggested that Roadmaster Birney take some of them and survey the road. Birney pointed out the impossibility of this plan but announced that the work, as far as he was concerned, would get all possible support.  
The final result was that the county court announced that a surveyor and his crew would commence surveying the road immediately and that in all probability the work would be done in thirty days.  
A committee of six was appointed to secure the right-of-way. Those selected were: Dick Smith, chairman, Joe Trippier, John Dean, George Richardson, Merton Kiddie and Frank Conley.
