ATTENDANCE AT BANQUET LARGE
(Continued from Page One.)
The Ad Club is taking every step to aid in making the day a big success. The Ad Club Men's Chorus will sing at noon and the Ad Club will furnish cars for transportation for those who have no other way of attending. All members were urged to take the noon hour off and be present to break bread with the pioneers.
The matter of the Union County Pioneer Association was further taken up by Judge T. H. Crawford, president of the association, who invited the Ad Club to attend. Also, representing the B. P. O. E., he invited them to attend the Flag Day exercises to be held this evening.
A. B. Cherry presented a beautiful bouquet of roses to be given to one of the ladies present. Each lady wrote her name on a card and the flower girls drew the lucky number which was Mrs. J. G. Hoin.
Elmer Stoddard gave a report of the Oregon Trail junketing trip on which he went as a representative of the Ad Club. He made special emphasis of the welcome given them at the town of Buhl, Idaho, where the chamber of commerce waited two hours for them to arrive, instead of giving it up as a bad job. Every town along the line was enthusiastic in welcoming the trail of the Old Oregon Trail and Mr. Stoddard expects that before long the entire trail will be properly blazoned under its true name.
A. W. Nelson spoke of the Cove Island City road and how much it would add to the city. He also reported for the publicity committee and announced that Union and Wallowa counties were uniting in putting signs at The Dalles and Ontario depicting the wonderful scenery in Wallowa county and also setting forth the advantages of the La Grande tourist camp. A booth will illustrate the branch line scenery and the La Grande tourist camp at the Annual Rose Festival at Portland.
Mr. Nelson further stated that the Ad Club would back up the Baker Fourth of July Pageant and would enter a float in the parade which was described by Mrs. George H. Currey. The float will depict the old time manners and styles and will be dedicated to the "Early Day Mothers." The La Grande band will play at Baker on the day of the Pageant, the Baker men to pay their wages and the Ad Club to furnish transportation. Any suggestions as to the completion of the float will be gladly received by A. W. Nelson, who is in charge of the float.
Elmer Stoddard again took the floor with a report on the proposed scenic highway to be built from the Oro Dell bridge and to terminate at the city limits in the western part of the city. "I have a sad story to relate," he said, "we took the matter up with the city commissioners and although they all appeared favorable, none of them seemed to take the necessary action. We laid the matter before the county court yesterday and they said 'fine and dandy—if you can suggest some way of getting the necessary money.' And there the matter hangs. The Cove Island City road just about domed the proposed scenic highway to suit itself." Mr. Stoddard sang the little ditty that goes, "One grasshopper jumps right over another grasshopper's back, etc." It appears that Cove was the one who did the jumping, however.
The next report to be heard was by C. J. Black, head of the reality committee. He stated that the spirit in this community is very good, with practically no discussion among the reality men. Five men, who are members of the Union County Realty Board, have transferred \$100,000 worth of real estate in the past spring and of this a good share was transferred to people from other sections who are making their homes here. "Probably another \$100,000 has been sold that we have no record of," said Mr. Black, "the real estate business is very active at present."
Norman Fries reported for the building committee and his report was very favorable indeed. "We are undergoing a building boom at present," he said, "but it is not one of the old time booms—that swindle mushroom towers that soon went—but it is a permanent increase in building that looks well for the future of La Grande."
He presented figures showing that during May of this year permits were issued for \$51,480 of construction, compared with \$19,410 during May, 1914, before the war began. \$5,265 during May, 1917, after America had entered the war and \$14,975 during May, 1921. Permits for the first five

months of this year total \$112,485.
Dr. Ray Morphy, post commander of the local American Legion, introduced Mr. Cook, who is in charge of the Signal Corps Pictures to be shown at the Star Theatre tomorrow evening under the title of "Powder River." He explained the pictures in detail, stating that they were the "cream of the pictures taken during the war" and that this would be the last showing of these films this summer.
Reverend Ross, the new Presbyterian minister, who has just recently arrived in La Grande, was the first to give an after dinner speech. He announced that he was from the "Powder River" country, whence the war films got their name, and gave a very interesting talk. Preliminary to his speech the pep committee sang a parody of "Working on the Railroad" that featured many of the Ad Club members. They responded with an encore, "The Old Grande Ronde."
The final address of the evening was given by Dr. W. T. Phy of Hot Lake. Starting out with the remark that there was very little to be said he turned loose a ready flow of wit that kept his audience convulsed with laughter and clamoring for more and more. "We don't need a chautauqua with Dr. Phy speaking," one of the members said, and another standing near heartily assented.
Before leaving for the dance, W. M. Dymes invited the La Grande people to be present at the Elgin Races on the Fourth of July.
This was one of the most interesting and successful meetings, both from a business and social standpoint that
