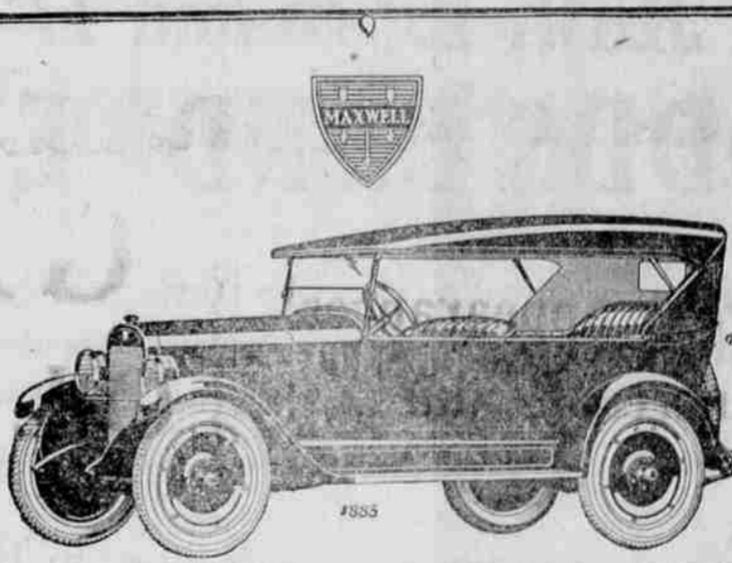

Men Robbed Tramps Of Money; Kill One

SANDPOINT, Ida, June 14.—Robert Bennett, Chicago, and Tony Beaver, Denver, men alleged to have robbed tramps on an incoming freight train of \$56, and later to have shot Chas. Dietrich, Northern Pacific agent, when he tried to arrest them, were sentenced Saturday by Judge John M. Flynn to one to two years in the state penitentiary at Boise, on pleas of guilty to charges of assault with a deadly weapon.

The men will be taken to Coeur d'Alene to answer on a robbery charge, authorities said.
